**Squaring Up.**—Several of the agents for the "News," who, for reasons that have been stated, were not able to settle up their accounts as they became due, are making exertions to square up at the earliest practicable date. There are a few dollars due from some who take their papers at the office that was to have been paid in a certain way, about this time or a little before, and when others are paying up they will, of course, come and do likewise.

**Territorial Roads.**—The road north of the city has been repaired, so we are informed, so that if there were not so much mud it would be in good condition. It cost the county \$100 to fix one of the mud holes or sloughs, and how much the city paid for fixing the

others we do not know. The money that has been expended by the city, county and territory on that road, in order to make and keep it in repair from time to time amounts to many thousands of dollars, notwithstanding which it has often been nearly or quite impassable as it has the past summer.

There has also been much labor performed upon the road leading to Jordan bridge, and thousands of dollars will yet have to be expended there before it can be made a good road, unless some better disposition can be made of the surplus waters of City creek which pass off in that direction than there was last spring.

For some weeks during the month of June that section of the road immediately at the foot of North Temple street as much represented the bottomless pit spoken of in Scripture as anything of which the mind of man could

have any conception. The corporation tried faithfully to keep the bottom of the road in, and after a lengthy struggle with some assistance from the county, the road was so far made passable that it has been used up to the present time.

**Seventeenth Ward School.**—Mr. Isaac Bowman, who is well known in the city as a competent and successful school teacher, has been engaged to teach in the Seventeenth ward during the coming winter, and commenced his school on Monday last. The school house has been comfortably fitted up and when a few more of the high, uncomfortable, backless seats are replaced by others now being made, the school room will be as well arranged for the comfort of the scholars as any in the city that has been built on the old stereotype plan. Mr. Bowman also proposes to teach evening schools for the benefit of young gentlemen or any others who may wish to attend, and we hope that those boys who have lately been hooting and carousing about the streets because their heads were so empty, will avail themselves of the opportunity now offered to store up a little useful knowledge and in some measure fill up the aching void in their craniums, which has been so long that it is grievous to be borne, if not by themselves and

their parents it certainly has been by their neighbors.

**California Cured With Grain.**—The wheat crop in California the past summer has been very abundant, and from reports there is a large surplus on hand, more than the people know what to do with, and many are cursing because there is so much bread stuffs and so little cash. The farmers with their granaries overflowing are complaining of "tight times."

**Mule Merchants or Thieves.**—From a reliable source we are informed that a company of some 10 men have lately taken the southern route to California with a band of about 85 mules and horses, probably including many of those that have been stolen from this and adjoining counties this fall.

The company traveled mostly in the night time and took good care to avoid the settlements, but were seen by many as they were feeding in the day time in secluded places, or traveling at night when they could not be easily recognized.

From reports there is reason for believing that there is another band of the kind being gathered up, as mules and horses are daily being stolen in every settlement mostly being taken from off the ranges, and are long another departure of horse and mule dealers from our settlements will probably be announced, if their rendezvous is not discovered in time to prevent their exodus to California.

**Merchandise From California.**—On Monday last a multi-train of 10 wagons arrived from California with merchandise, six wagons belonging to W. S. Dodge, and four to Messrs. J. B. Kimball & Co. The trains left Sacramento about the 29th of September and came from Carson valley, over the Simpson route to Camp Floyd.

**Massacre of Indians.**—A late number of the Pimas Argus says that the account that had been published of a terrible massacre that occurred on Pitt river in which it appeared that one band of Indians attacked and destroyed another was an error. The Indians killed were a band of the Pitt River tribe, and were attacked in their rancheria by a company of whites known as the Pitt River company, a company without authority of any kind, a lawless, reckless set of desperadoes. Our informant, Mr. Henry Landt, acting as a guide to Gen. Kibbe, was on the ground soon after the foul murder was committed, and estimated the number killed at 90, 10 of whom were warriors and the balance women and children.
