Ordered to Take up War Positions Along the German Frontier.

"FRENCHY NO. 1" SUPPOSED TO BE THE MURDERER.

The Jury in the Casey Murder Case Unable to Agree on a Verdict.

WAR PREPARATIONS.

The French Army Placed on the Frontier.

This city April 29.—The newspapers of this city report that the French army will be exercised in the night. The military district department of Meurthe et Moselle will take up positions in the night, and the troops in Meurthe et Moselle will be reinforced by a large force of the cavalry and infantry brought together by the extensive mobilization of the forces. The reserves will be called up, and the positions will be occupied by all the troops that they would have to hold in an effort to repel an invasion of German troops.

The New York Hotel Service.

New York, April 29.—Inspector Byrne this morning made public a statement to the effect that "Frenchy No. 1" had been ascertained to have slept in the East River hotel on the night of the murder. The married woman, Carrie Brown, was found dead in "Frenchy's" sleep in the room. On the evening of the murder, Carrie Brown was seen going into the hotel in company with a strange man. This was the place where he slept. It is believed that "Frenchy No. 1" then went to Carrie Brown's room, that they remained, and that the result was the murder of the woman.

The Marion Murders.

MARION, April 29.—The Marquis of the British House of Commons, Major-General Sir Charles Compton, Captain Political Agent Greenwood and others of the members of the commissioners' staff who were killed by the rebels, were buried yesterday afternoon in their native land, while the rebels, who are still pursuing the retreating military forces, which take place Monday next, to honor the dead.
