Denver, Jan. 27 .- A Republican special from Durango, Colo., says:

It has become known here that state ments contained in dispatches to the press regarding the destitute condition press regarding the destitute condition of the Navajo Indians, though disput-ed by some, are true. The Indians are starving in crowds. Many of them are poorly clad and the weather has been unusually severe. Those acquainted with the situation are that the government must do something at once for their relief or hundreds of the Indians will perish.

A special to the News from Durango, Colo., says the Navajo Indians wtheir reservation in New Mexico, 60 or 70 miles south of Durango, are in a starving condition. The story is given on the authority of white residents of that section. The correspondent says: Hundreds of these people are stary ing and suffering from cold. Some of the children wear nothing but called shirts and many are naked. From three to five inches of show has failen on several occasions. In numerous lodges they are without a crumb to eat. Many are wandering about begging. The drouth of last season left them with-out crops and the rivers and springs dried up, their stock perishing for wan of food and drink. The squaws have been unable to get material with which to weave blankets. They have given up all their cheap silver jewelry and trinkets for flour and meal long ago and the traders cannot carry them.
