CHAMBERLAIN NOT AFRAID. Dissolution of Parliament Has

London, Feb. 16 .- Joseph Chamberlain, the former colonial secretary, had a full house when he rose to address the house of commons today on the fiscal amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne proposed by Mr. Asquith (Liberal) yester-day. A dissolution of parliament had no terrors for him, he said. He was

New York, Feb 17.—Assignment of dates by the Jockey club to local tracks, just announced, includes no time for Morris park, and it is understood that an ar-rangement has been reached over that mart of the local racing situation which has been bothering eastern turfmen for some time. Some time ago it was re-ported that Aqueduct track would be sold to a syndic.te, and its dates transferred to Morris park, where it had been ex-ported last season there would be no more racing and that time would thus be made open for the new Belmont park track on Long Island. However, dates have now been assigned for Aqueduct and for the Westchester Racing association, which will control th-new track, and no time has been given Morris park. No official explanation has been given but it is understood on good authority that the club controlling Morris nark has assigned its lease to some of the others who will pay \$25,000 a year and clease its gates. tion's contentions in regard to a disso-lution were a fantastic pretense. Stanford University, Cal., Feb. 16.— Athletic trainer A. W. Moulton, who has conditioned Stanford athletes for the past four years, was today signed by the ex-cutive committee of the Associated Stu-dents for two years to come, at a salary of \$1,500 a year, which is an increase of \$150 over the salary he has received in the past. Philadelphia, Feb 16.-Jay Cooke, whose fame as a financler is worldwide, died tenight at the home of his son-in-taw. Charles D. Barney, at Ogenitz, a suburb of this city, aged 83 years. He had been suffering from general debility, the re-sult of old age, for several years. His condition was not considered seri-ous, however, and his death tonight came rather suddenly. London, Feb. 16 .- H. H. Asquith' amendment to the reply of the speech from the throne was defeated in the house of commons tonight by a vote of 311 to 248. This amendment, which de-

clared. "that the various aspects of the fiscal question have been fully discussed in the country for nearly two years, and that the time has come for submitteing the question to the people without further delay." was debated throughout today's session of the house f commons
