THE FRENCH AGAIN SUCCESSFUL!

Thionville in Flames!

DUEL BETWEEN A FRENCH AND A PRUSSIAN SHIP!

Mortality in the German Armies!

PARIS SHORT OF PROVISIONS!

Vessel Wrecked and all hands lost!

NEW YORK.

Condemned to death—Mortality among German soldiers—More Fighting—Wrecked—Pennsylvania to be represented in the Cabinet.

NEW YORK.—A Tribune's cablegram, dated London, the 13th inst., states that a special correspondent at Versailles telegraphs on the 13th, that he has trustworthy information which represents that the Paris supplies will not last exceeding three weeks, and that the Prussians are not likely to bombard the city.

The Manchester Examiner, of the 11th ult., says, a large ship, named the German, which sailed on the 5th ult. for St. Johns, N. B., was wrecked on the reef of rocks in St. Ives Bay, Cornwall. All hands were lost. The crew numbered twenty-two men, of whom no tidings have been heard.

A novelty arrived this morning at Commodore's in the shape of a palace stock cat, with eighteen cats, from Chicago. Each animal occupied a separate stall, at the head of which was a box supplied with feed and water.

Several hundred workmen were discharged on Saturday from the Brooklyn navy yard. Others will be discharged this week.

NEW YORK, 14.—The Tribune's Washington correspondent, telegraphs last night as follows: "When the President left here on Friday evening, it was given out, semi-officially, that his visit to Philadelphia was of a strictly private nature. It is learned, however, that the visit is not merely private, but has a strong political significance, which will be fully developed soon after his return. The President's friends assert he is anxious to have Pennsylvania represented in his Cabinet, having so expressed himself on several occasions lately; and that his present visit to Philadelphia is for the purpose of consultation with some of the leading men, that a fit and proper selection may be agreed upon. Pennsylvania who have been visiting the President lately, have been making the point, that as New York is hopelessly Democratic and Pennsylvania is strongly Republican, the latter State should have a preference in the Cabinet. The President does not agree in the assertion that New York is hopelessly lost to the Republican party, and will not allow her to go unrepresented in his councils. He now admits, however, that Missouri is thoroughly Democratic; that the recent victory of Gratz Brown in Missouri makes what used to be termed the border States a unit against the Republican party, and, consequently, nothing is to be gained to his administration by giving to these States the most powerful office in the way of political patronage within his gift. Hence it is understood that Cresswell will retire from the Postmaster General's office, and that a Pennsylvanian will be appointed in his stead. This statement is from the President's own partisans, and should be considered trustworthy.

HAVANA, 14, via NEW YORK, 14, 2:30 p.m.—The court martial in session here has condemned to death all the leaders of the rebellion, members of the various Cuban factions, and all other persons who have been instrumental in the rebellion. The estates of all such will be confiscated.

Associated press dispatches, London, 13, and Tours dispatches, dated Friday evening, repeat the statement that there was fighting all day on Thursday, near Coulmiers, in which the French were successful, and that Paffers occupied Chevilly, north of Orleans, taking 600 prisoners and two guns.

A special to the NY, London, 13.—A careful condensation of reports received here, by high medical authority, in the British army, from all the German armies now in France, shows that the aggregate deaths of German soldiers averaged from twenty to fifty per day, which is due in a great degree to bad sanitary arrangements and neglect of sick and wounded. The opinion in military circles here is universal that unless the Germans can end the war before January, their final defeat is inevitable.

WASHINGTON.

Fish Will Probably Resign.

WASHINGTON, 14.—It is reported from trustworthy sources that Fish will withdraw from the Cabinet before the termination of the present Congress. It is said to be his desire to resign after the assembling of Congress, but it is understood to be the President's wish that he remain during the session. Judge Edwards' report is spoken of as successful to Fish.

As special says an Oregon delegation, representing the war debt of that State, which amounts to three or four millions, is here and pressing Senator Williams for the Chief Justice of the Court of Claims, vice Carey. The cor-

respondent says they speak on identity of success, though that seems hardly probable, as the understanding a few weeks ago, in official circles, was that at the end of his Senatorial term, next March, Williams would be offered the position of Attorney-General, in place of Akerman, who is anxious to retire to private life, through ill health.

MISSOURI.

Elections.

St. Louis, 14.—The Republican has returns from all but eight counties in the State, from which it claims that the lower house of the Legislature stands: Democrats 78, Liberals 14, Liberals 21, Republicans 17. In the Senate, it says, neither party will have a clear majority, but there are enough fusionists who will co-operate with the Democrats to make that body substantially Democratic.

A Washington special says an effort is being made to exclude Senator Schurz from all Senatorial caucuses, and drop him from important Senate committees, especially the committee on foreign affairs.

Governor McClurg, of Missouri, is spoken of in official circles for an important bureau office, to be made vacant soon for him.

LOUISIANA.

Duel at sea—Election.

The New Orleans Times has reports by that steamer of a duel off Havana, between the French gunboat Bouscat and the Prussian gunboat Meteor. The Spanish war steamer Hernando Cortes, with the Captain General of Cuba and other prominent officials accompanied the Meteor. De Rodas was umpire. The fight lasted one hour, when the Bowset withdrew. Both vessels were badly damaged. The Bowset reports one killed and several wounded; the Meteor, three killed and one wounded. Another fight is expected. Both vessels returned to Havana.

NEW ORLEANS, 14.—The official returns of the election show that the Republicans made a clean sweep of the city, by over 5,000 majority. The Republicans claim four Members of Congress. The 5th District is doubtful.

FOREIGN NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN.

France looking up—Railroad Tunnel saved to.

CORK, 13.—Some fifty soldiers undertook, to-night, to avenge the death of Gilson, a private in the first dragoon guards, who was killed in a quarrel with some citizens last week. They provoked a fight with the citizens, after which they were soon reinforced by forty of their comrades, and the mob of the city also increased; violence followed, and the row was only stopped by a strong body of police. Several soldiers, police and citizens were injured, but no deaths are reported. All the soldiers are under arrest.

LONDON, 14.—The Times correspondent, writing from Tours, says the moral effect of the victory at Orleans is incalculable. Reinforcements have gone forward to General De Paladines, who now has a large and effective army.

The reports that Paris is distressingly short of provisions are confirmed by dispatches from various quarters today.

Bismarck has written a letter formally denying that he had any negotiations whatever with the Empress Eugenie.

One of the tunnels of the Straubourg railroad has fallen in, hopelessly interrupting communication by that line.

Much snow has fallen lately in the northeastern part of France. The Prussians have captured the towns of Isaur-le-Doubs and Clerval, in the department of Doubs. After a brief skirmish the mobles, who were in possession of the towns, retired to the southward. The French troops have entirely disappeared from that section of country.

FRANCE.

Prussians advancing—The French successful.

VERSAILLES, 14.—Gen. Von der Tann, in his official report to headquarters here, announces that in the battle before Orleans, on the 9th, he lost 42 officers and 867 men killed and wounded. The French admit that their loss was 2,000.

TOURS, 14.—Advices from Lyons show the Prussians, advancing steadily in the east.

Garibaldi is at Chagny, where also there is a French General with an effective force. It is supposed the further armies will join and resist the further advance of the enemy. The work of fortifying Lyons continues to this day. An engagement occurred on Saturday between the garde mobile and the enemy, near Everux. The French were successful, driving the enemy. A battle is expected to-day at Toury, as the army of the Loire is advancing on the town from Orleans.

BELGIUM.

Thionville being bombarded.

ARLON, 14.—Thionville is bombarded by the Prussians. Fires have broken out there in consequence, and on Saturday the entire town was burning.

BRUSSELS, 14.—The Belgian government is negotiating with the authorities at Tours and Paris to prevent the inundation of the marsh lands around Dunkerke. The French military authorities have contemplated taking this step as a means of defense against the Prussians, but Dunkerke is so near the Belgian frontier that Belgium herself would be the greatest sufferer.
