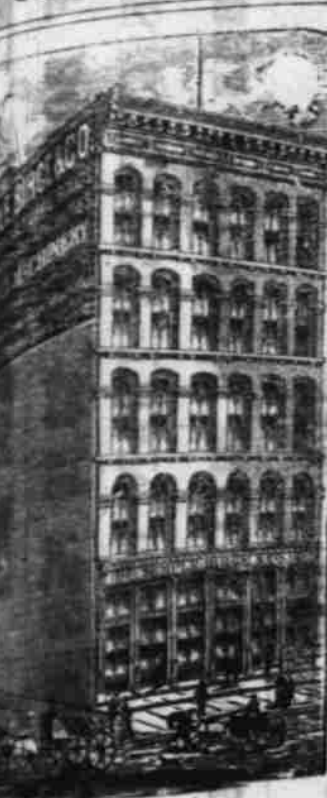

CHICAGO, 16.—The Tribune's

London special says, a correspond-

ent in Constantinople writes that

it is by no means certain whether

treachery has not much to do with

the had performance of the Turk-

ish army in Asia, and those who

can only account for the insuffi-

cient fortification of those places

by the theory that coveted Russian

gold has been at work. They assert

that many Turkish field officers

have been heavily bribed by Rus-

sians. Things are even worse at Con-

stantinople, and it is said that both

Mahmoud Damad and Redif Pasha

have been bought by the Muscovites.

And they will get a large

sum when peace is made, favoring

Major Powell's Surveying Expe-

dient.

Major Powell, of the United

States Army, in charge of the Geo-

graphical Survey of the Territories,

has already sent out several parties

of which are at work in Utah Ter-

ritory. The triangulation party under

Prof. Thompson, is located on the

eastern slope of the Wasatch

mountains. These geographical

parties, under Buschaw, Wheeler

and Grover, are prosecuting their

work on Utah, Price and Lower

Gila, Bismarck and Snake rivers,

under Captain Dutton, of the

Ordinance Department of the United

States Army, is located on the

Sevier plateau. Powell will leave

here about the first of July for the

field and in the meantime other

parties will be fitted out for

work this season, one of which will

make a specialty of the subject of

irrigation in Utah. It is expected

that the geographical work in east-

ern Utah, which has been pro-

ceeded with vigor for some years

past, will be finished this season.

War Correspondents in a Bad Fix.
