BATTLE RAGES AROUND BALLINGER

Millionaire Banker Farson of Chicago Defends Secretary in Irrigation Congress.

SESSION WAS VERY LIVELY.

National Forestry Controversy Policy Has Come to be Known as the "Ballinger-Pinchot Feud."

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 12.—John William, former United States senator from Washington and John Farson, millionaire banker of Chicago, today came to the defense of Secy. of the Interior Ballinger before the National Irrigation congress and succeeded in keeping the so-called "Ballinger-Pinchot feud" in the public eye.

Discussion about the hotels last night seemed to indicate that both sides of the reclamation controversy were content to let matters rest, notwithstanding the rumors that the Ballinger supporters intended to make a detailed reply to the charges offered by former Gov. George C. Pardee of California. The forepart of today's session did not offer, seemingly, the proper opening for a continuation of the trouble until Mr. Pardee rose to question a statement made by a speaker. Dr. Pardee warned to his subject to such an extent that soon he had brought in his charges against Secy. Ballinger and again accused that official of permitting the opening for entry of valuable water power sites.

WHAT DID PARDEE MEAN? This brought Mr. Farson to his feet, asking Dr. Pardee if he meant to insinuate that the secretary was dishonest. With Dr. Pardee's reply that he meant no such accusation, the inci-

dent was dropped, only, however, after several other Ballinger supporters had taken occasion to demand specific charges of the Californian.

The afternoon session was hardly under way when W. V. Ferrell of Ferrell, Ida., took the floor and during the time allowed for discussion attacked severely the Washington Power company, the concern which supplies power to the city of Spokane. At the expiration of his five-minute time allowance there were cries from all parts of the building for Mr. Ferrell to "go on."

A vote was taken and finally the Idaho man was allowed to proceed, which he did after a rough and ready fashion that brought repeated cheers.

"I have been a settler in Idaho for 25 years," he shouted, "and there are many who have lived there with me during that time. They have worked hard to make homes, and now, after a quarter of a century, the Washington Power company, one of the many which threaten our very lives, has dammed up our valley, overpowered our lands, dried up our crops and many are about to lose their very means of livelihood. I'm not an anarchist, and I want to see the law obeyed, but I want to say that there are men in my town who will smother that dam with dynamite and send a 40-foot wall of water down this valley, and what will happen to Spokane will make the Johnstown flood look like a common shedding of tears if something is not done."

AUTOMOBILE MOWS DOWN

COLUMNS OF TROOPS

London, Aug. 12.—Reports have reached London of a peculiar motor accident near Trowbridge, Wiltshire, where military maneuvers are being held. A motor car belonging to a London newspaper ran into a column of territorial troops who were on the march, moving them down more quickly than a volley from a battery of artillery could have done.

The accident had less serious results than was at first reported, although with fuller accounts it seems wonderful that the fatalities were not many.

Men were for some time in columns of fours. They had just let one automobile pass, when the newspaper car, running down hill, struck the rear column and plowed its way through the whole column, leaving only about 30 men on their feet.

Only one man was killed, but another was so badly injured that he is not expected to recover. Two were seriously and six slightly injured. Many were cut or bruised.
