Communication from Auditor Hoag asking for an appropriation on police account for \$5000 on salary account. Five thousand dollars appropriated.

Judge Laney reported that \$3184 had been assessed and collected as fines during November and that \$662 of the amount had been paid in

labor. Committee ou police A communication from R. Klet-ting was read in which he stated Prof. Ware asked \$1000 for making an examination of the revised plans of the city and county building. He wished to modify his proposition by providing that the cost of the examination did not exceed \$250. His proposition made at the last meeting was not to be strictly adhered to, but was intended simply to ferm a basis for a more definite arrangement.

Councilman Hall called up the report of the committee in regard to the employment of an architect, which was submitted at the last

meeting.

City Attorney Merritt reported that Mr. Kletting was at his office, and they discussed the plan of a contract at considerable length, but nothing definite was done because Mr. Murphy reported that the county had refused to go any further with the matter.

Councilman Pembroke moved that the committee be instructed to confor with the county with a view to obtaining new plans, and that the matter be left open for competition. Councilman Spafford—I move that we reject Apponyi's plans alto-

gether.

Mr. Hall-I do not feel competent to condemn the plans of Mr. Apponyi as relates to architectural strength, and I do not believe the committee which now has the matter in hand are able to do so; I believe the present movement is nothing more than a freak of prejudice. What we do now should be done with the advice of a competent counsel. By competent counsel is a local architect who constructed buildings in our own city and whose work-

Councilman Pembroke - There must be a new deal in this matter;

I will not be satisfied without it, neither will the people. Councilman James—In my opinion one thing only can be done, and that is to have a consultation with Mr. Apponyi and settle with him or settle the matter in the courts. Committee on fireworks reported

A communication from the Mayor was read stating that he had appointed Matthew Rhodes to fill the vacancy on police force caused by the resignation of officer Joseph H. Raleigh. Appointment confirmed.

RESOLUTIONS.

Councilman Hall offered the following resolutiou:

Be it resolved that the committee on finance, with the treasurer associated, are hereby authorized to decide on designing and have lithographed the designing and have intrographed the paving and curbing and guttering bonds contemplated to be issued, as paving and curbing and guttering is ordered by this council.

Adopted.

The following orders were made: That the work of constructing side-walks on both sides of Second South Street, between First East and Third East streets, the estimated cost of which is \$14,738, assessed on the abutting lands and in proportion to the front feet abutting on the street, be done under the supervision of the board of public works; that the curbing and guttering on the south side of South Temple, the estimated cost of which is \$21,824, assessed in the same way, be done in like manner; that the work paving First East Street, from South Temple to Fourth South, the estimated cost of which is \$87,150, assessed in the same way, be done under the same supervision.

Councilman Lynn offered the

following resolution;

Resolved, That the committee on streets submit to the council at its earliest convenience a report as to the advisability and feasibility of paying, curbing and guttering East Temple Street from South Temple to Third Street from South Temple to Third South; West Temple Street from South Temple to Third South; South Temple Street from West Temple to First East; Fourth South, from West Temple to First East; Speend South, from West Temple to First East; Third South, from West Temple to First East, and the character of the material to be used thereon.

Resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute certain contracts. Carried.

The cemetery ordinauce was theu taken np and amended so that the price of lots in Plat P and Q be raised to \$50; in Plat R, \$25; in Plat C. \$100; while the price of inside lots shall be increased to \$35; that the sexton shall be entitled to ten per cent of the sale of all lots under \$25, and \$2,50 for all lots sold for the action taken. He asked that

more than \$25. With these amendments the ordinance passed.

Councilman Cohn said he wished to introduce another ordinance pertaining to the city cemetery. is as follows:

An ordinance altering the width of a certain street in the City Cemetery

a certain street in the City Cemetery of Salt Lake City.
Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, that the street running north and south on the east side of Plats E, F, H and B in the City Cemetery of Salt Lake City, being three rods in width, be and hereby is altered and narrowed to two rods in width by cutting off one rod rods in width, by cutting off one rod of sald street on the west side there-

Section 2. Said one rod of said street so cut off on the west side thereof shall become a part of the City Cemetery and the public easement thereon is hereby abolished.
Section 2. This ordinance shall be in

force from and after its passage.

Read the first time and laid on the

table for one week.

Councilman Colm then said-With reference to the ordinance introduced and the one that has been passed tonight we have received nothing but slander, pure and simple, from our friend the NEWS, they say that we have been working the cemetery for all that it is worth; and so we have, but not in the manner intimated by the critic referred to.

Councilman Hall-In our manner of conducting this cemetery we should be very careful, especially as pertains to the amount of means expended. History repeats itself in cities as in nations, and the time is not far distant when the growth of our city will demand that we seek a larger and more remote restingplace for the dead.

The adopted report of the com-mittee on fire department again came up, when the appropriation list was reached.

Councilman Hall-We are putting on too much style; all the tinsel and show of three times the number of inbabitants that we have is carried on. A more judicious expenditure of the people's means must be had. The \$600 team recently purchased was a lavish expenditure of money. A \$300 team would have answered all the purpose just as well.

Councilman James also favored a more economical expenditure of the city funds; the treasury was getting low with so many appropriations.

Councilman Anderson said that every dollar of the amount was needed.

On a call of the roll only two members voted in favor of the appropriation, while Councilmen Propriation, while Councilmen Wolstenholm, Armstrong, Hall, Karrick and James voted against it. The appropriation was lost, it requiring eight votes to carry it.

Councilman James, who voted against it, moved a reconsideration. This was carried, and Mr. James then moved that an appropriation

of \$3500 be made. Councilman Auderson said that they might as well refuse the entire appropriation as to cut it down, and he was inclined to be indignant over
