Want More Pay.

Minneapolls, July 28 .- The 535 nailers and packers in the twenty-two flour mills at Minneapolis have presented to their employers a demand for an in-crease of wages. They also demand a contract for five years. The employers have agreed to raise the wages, but will enter into no contract. The men met today and decided upon a demand for only a one-year contract. Tomor-row the revised demands will be presented. If an active strike is declared the nailers and packers will have the support of the thousands of others employed in the mills.

Replacing Strikers.

New York, July 29,-The Herald's correspondent in Managua, Nicaragua, reports that the amount of coupons due o English bondholders in January, 1902, has already been forwarded by the Nicaraguan government. Angelo Caligaris, representing an American association, has secured a new bank con-cession. The capital is to be \$10,000,000 sliver currency. The principal condi-tions of the concession are that the bank shall loan to the government of Nicaragua \$5,000,000 silver to enable it to redeem its notes in circulation. This loan is to be payable with 60 per cent of the Atlantic coast customs duties, The notes are also to be maintained at par with silver currency. The national congress will meet on Aug. 1. The London bank of Central America has been closed by order of the London directors.

Successful Skirmish.

Pretoria, July 29 .- Col. Garrett has had a successful skirmish near Verceniging. His force captured 25 Boers and a number of cattle and vagons.

London, July 29 .-- A dispatch from Cape Town says: Boers are scat-tered throughout the upper districts of Cape Colony. Some are within a few miles of Indwe. Others are around Jamestown and between Moltao and Burghersdorp, Several parties are close to Craddock.
