Claimed That Parties on Defense Were Not Residents of This District-The Salient Points.

As an answer to the demurrer interposed by counsel for defendants in the case of the United States vs. the Utah Fuel company, the Pleasant Valley Coal company and the Morton Trust company, a lengthy brief has been filed in the Federal court by plaintiff's attorneys. The contentions set forth in the demurrer were three in number. namely, that the court had no jurisdiction, because the parties to the defense were not residents of this district; that there were no reservations of mineral lands provided for in the Utah Enabling act: and last, that the lands in ques-tion were pronounced by land office officials to be non-mineral, and that the said report was binding upon the government. Following are some of the salient points contained in the brief:

SALIENT POINTS.

The suit being brought by the Unit-"The suit being brought by the only ed States and drawing in question as it does a federal statute," says the government's brief, "the general juris-diction of this court over the subject matter cannot be doubted. It rests matter cannot be doubted. It rests upon section 1 of the act of March 3, 1887, providing for concurrent jurisdiction of circuit courts of the United States with the several state courts. States with the several state courts. "The Utah Fuel company is a cor-poration of the state of New Jersey, and the Morion Trust company is a corporation of the state of New York, and the complainant in this case being the United States, and the jurisdiction the United states, and the jurisdiction in this case being not dependent upon the diverse citizenship of the parties, this court would not, under the general provisions above set forth, have juris-diction over the non-resident defendants.

AS TO SECTION 8.

"It is conceded by opposing that section 8 of the act of March 3, 1875, forms an exception to the general rule prescribing the jurisdiction of circuit courts in cases like this, and in certain classes of cases operates to ex-"The language of the section is as follows: "That when in any suit com-menced in any circuit court of the United States to enforce any legal or equitable lien upon, or claim to, or re-move an incumbrance or lien or cloud upon the title to real or personal prop-erty within the district where such suit s brought, etc.'

is brought, etc.' "It would seem that no reasonable question ought to arise on this score," asserts the brief. "The relief prayed for is as follows: That the selection certified to the state of Utah of the lands described be can-celled; that it be recreed that the fille to said lands is in the complainant; that it be decreed that the State of Utah never acquired any right therein; that all patents for said lands issued by the state be declared void; that the defendant be enjoined and restrained from mining any coal, and that it be rereasonable sum for such coal as it may be found the defendant has removed from the hands.
