JOHN L. SULLIVAN IDOL OF THE RING

One Time World's Champion Arrives in Salt Lake With
Jake Kilrain.

"BIG FELLOW" LOOKS WELL.

In His Opinion Jim Jeffries Will Never
Fight Again—Thinks Training
Would Hurt Him.

On the register at the Knutsford appears the name "John L. Sullivan," a name known to every American and a name that will never be forgotten as long as athletics battle in the roped arena. The famous John L. Sullivan, world's champion for many years, is in Salt Lake. With him came Jake Kilrain, another man who made a great name for himself in the prize ring. The old time gladiators were accompanied by Manager Frank Hall and Arthur Reynolds. The Salt Palace management has booked Sullivan and Kilrain for night exhibitions. The old-time fighters will show the younger generation how they fought in the days when the green turf was the ring and when bare knuckles were used instead of gloves.

Of course they will wear gloves in their exhibition, but will show some of the blows used in the battle between the two in Mississippi.

JOHN L. PHILOSOPHIC.

John L. is gray, but he looks hale and hearty. His skin is clear and his eyes have not lost their luster. He is nearly 45 years old and weighs close to 300 pounds. Sullivan is a member of the temperance union and never tires of talking about the folly of using liquor.

Referring to the present day fighters, John L. said: "The game is not what it used to be. The game is not what it was. As to Jeffries, Sullivan said: 'Jeff was a great fighter, but he is through with the ring. He will not fight again, in my opinion, and if he did I think he would be a failure. He is not an old man by any means he could not condition himself for another fight. All of them see the end of their days in the ring. They all have to go as I did.'"

JAKE KILRAIN.

Jake Kilrain, Sullivan's sparring partner, was born in 1850.

In the winter of 1882 he became an assistant at the old club of Tim McCarthy in Boston, and from that time on for several years his entire attention was devoted to boxing. Very quickly he showed his fitness by whipping Harry Allen, George Godfrey for 4 rounds and fighting draws with Jim Goode, Charlie Mitchell and Mike Cleary. Later, after a rest of several years, he was again in the ring. He was given the Richard K. Fox diamond championship belt, and in 1887 Kilrain fought Jim Smith for the world's championship of the world. The battle went on for a draw, the rules governing the London prize fight. This battle with Smith led to the great mill with John L. Sullivan in Mississippi in which Kilrain lost.

Jake was beaten by Corbett in a six-round go for points and lost to Frank Hayes in 1890. His last fight was with Slavin in 1890. During his career he has fought over 150 battles, and today weighs 254 pounds and is in good condition.

CLARKE BREAKS RECORD ON OGDEN SAUCER.

Clarke, the speedy little Australian, another record to his list at the Ogden track last evening. He smashed the world's record for half-mile open, covering the distance in 36 seconds. The record was formerly held by Iver Lawson. The finish was a sensational one as the Australian fought it out at the finish with Clarke.
