NEW YORK.

New York, 17.—Great interest is felt

in the result of the race between the

City of Bremen, the crack ship of the

ocean line, and the Oceanic, the pioneer

ship of the recently established

White Star line. Both ships sailed

from the port on Saturday, the 8th

inst., at 10 a. m., and are conse-

quently about due off Queens town.

The tornado that passed over this

city yesterday afternoon committed

great damage on the shipping in the

harbor.

ILLINOIS.

Religious difficulty.

CHICAGO, 17.—The correspondence

between Bishop Doane and the

wardens of Christ Church, Rev. Che-

ney's, is published this morning. The

Bishop notifies the wardens of his in-

tention to hold an Episcopal visita-

tion of Christ Church on Sunday, Aug.

13th, for the purpose of examining the

state of the church administration, ad-

ministering the right of confirmation,

the sacrament, &c., and begging the

assistance of the minister of the

church in good standing to be secured,

inasmuch as Christ Church is now with-

out a rector. The wardens' reply is

rather sharp. They intimate very

plainly that Bishop Doane has a right

as good standing as they require, or

indeed, as any other man; that such

being the case, no such action as the

Bishop's is necessary; that all apostolic

mission of the serfs by your Imperial

command is the admiration of the

world; and it has a favorable effect upon

our own government in bringing about

shortly a reward the emancipation of

four millions of slaves. Confidence in

the well known benevolence of your

Imperial Majesty, emboldens us to ex-

press the great sympathy felt by mil-

lions in our own country with the large

numbers of your Imperial Majesty's sub-

jects in the Baltic provinces, whose con-

dition, as described in the report made

to your Imperial Majesty by Count Bo-

regukli, in April, 1864, and who by ex-

isting laws were prevented from openly

returning to the faith of their Russian

ancestors. As Americans we venture to

refer to our own national experience, as

illustrating the efforts of religious lib-

erty on the welfare of individuals and the

stability of government. By religious

liberty we do not intend freedom from

all authority, much less that all opin-

ions are equally good; but simply the

right of every individual to worship ac-

cording to his own free con-

science, responsible only to the author-

ity of God as revealed in his holy word.

In the United States religious demon-

strations and forms of worship are equal

before the law, which supporting some

protects all, and never interferes with

their internal affairs. The orthodox

Greek Church, though with us the

smallest of our religious communities,

perpetuates its opinions, and exerts its

influence as freely in the United States as

in the empire of Russia. This religious

freedom we have found not only

relieves the state from agitation and

care, but is the surest pledge of social

order and national unity. By promoting

mutual respect and charity among the

different denominations, and by in-

augurating security to all in the com-

mon enjoyment of their most sacred

rights, we respectfully solicit you, with

our brethren in Europe, in behalf of

your Imperial Majesty's subjects in the

Baltic provinces, that they may be per-

mitted to worship God and adore their

children according to the faith of their

fathers and the free preference of their

own conscience; and still further in

honor of the Russian dominions, dis-

tinguished by intelligence, piety and

scholarship, we have labored long and

successfully, among the Armenians,

Nestorians and other Christians under

Mohammedan rule, in Turkey, and on

the borders of the Russian dominions.

We beg leave to ask that your Imperial

Majesty, that your Christian govern-

ment may be induced to grant withal

in the limits of its jurisdiction, among

all subjects not belonging to the ortho-

dox Greek Church, liberty of worship

and religious instruction, including the

circulation of the holy scriptures.

FRANCE.

A terrible explosion.

PARIS, 18.—A great fire was oc-

casioned at Rheims to-day by the ex-

plosion of a quantity of petroleum. Fifty

persons were killed and wounded by

the explosion, and many buildings were

burned. A large portion of the city is

burned.

PARIS, 18.—The official journals

state that the explosion of the works at

Vincennes was accidental; six per-

sons were killed and thirty wounded.

A solemn requiem service will be held

in the cathedral of Notre Dame on

Tuesday, in honor of the martyred

Archbishop Darboy.
