A CO-OPERATIVE MURDER SOCIETY.—A remarkable trial is about to come off at Ravenna, Italy. Twenty-four persons are charged with the commission of thirteen murders in that town between 1865 and 1871, one of the victims being Signor Cappa, the Procuratore del Re, whose fate has been much talked of during the last six years. The prisoners belonged to a co-operative society, and they held meetings in which there was a strange mixture of crime and buffoonery, with a tinge of politics. They sent out threatening, anonymous letters, and had the audacity to placard the names of persons they intended to murder. Some of these were actually assassinated, while unsuccessful attempts were made on the lives of others. For a long time the criminals escaped detection, but the suspicion at length fell on this *soi-disant* co-operative society, and on the arrest of some of these the murders ceased; but it was not easy to ascertain the degree of individual responsibility. It was found that the criminals composed only a small section of the society, and that they held separate meetings, the object of which was always to pass sentence of death on some person who was obnoxious to them. Full information was given by Rasta, one of the officials of the society, who was in the secrets of the band, though he expressed the utmost horror at their acts.—*Ex.*

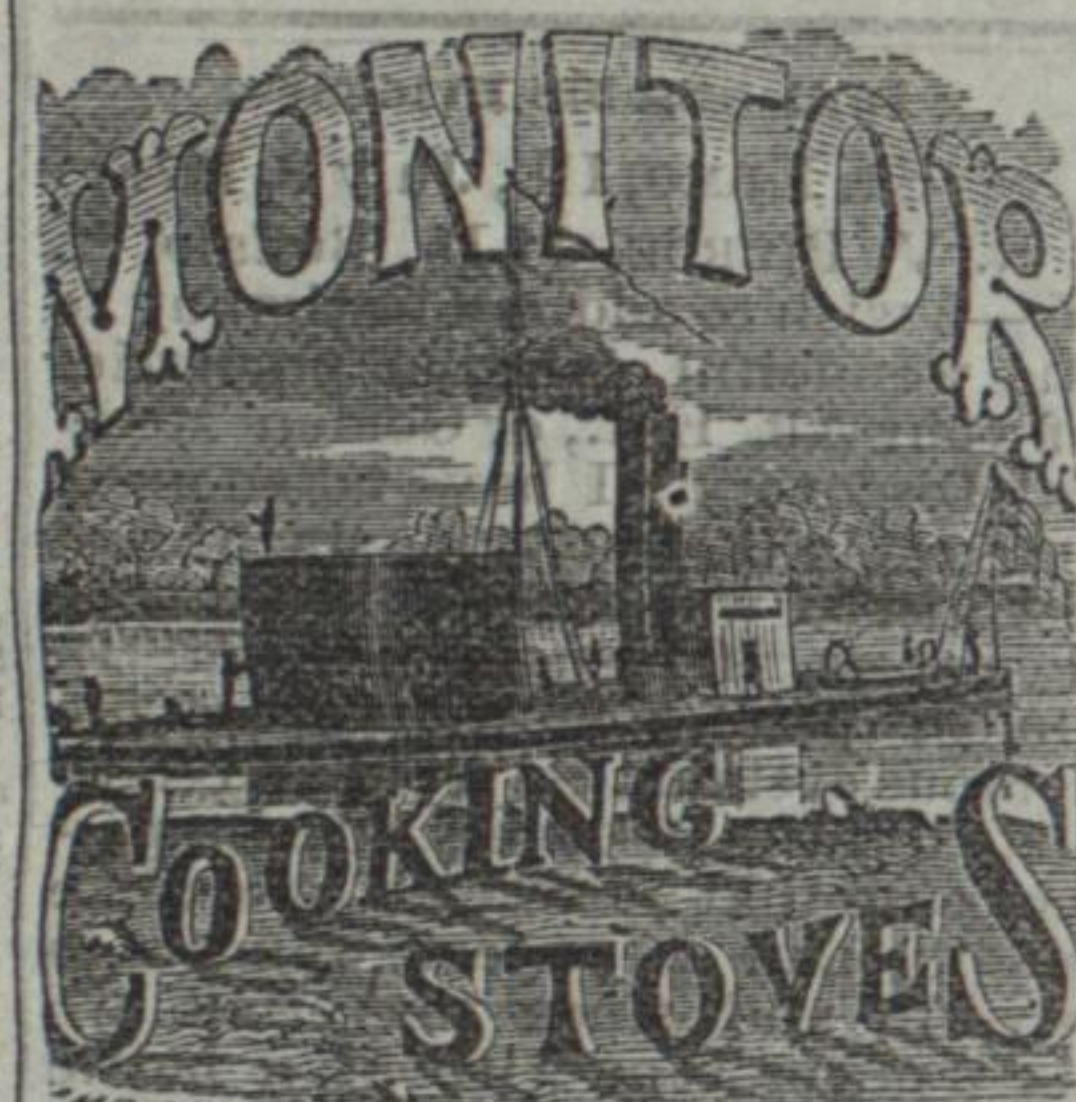

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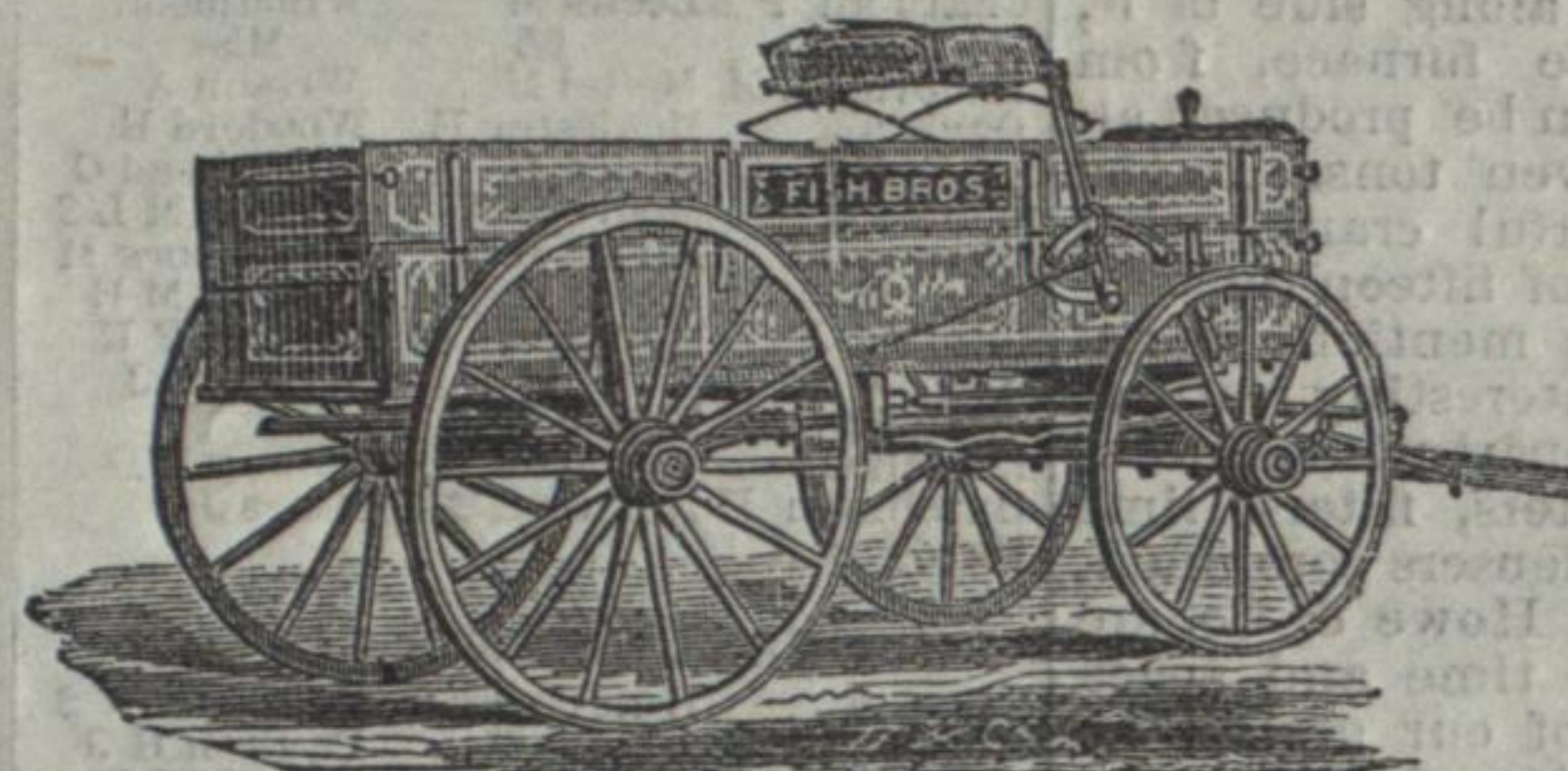
