LOCAL BRIEFS.

Harris in Duluth.—Fisher Harris is in Duluth, Minn., where he will speak on the "See America First" movement. Mr. Harris will visit Minneapolis next and then Chicago.

Will Meet Monday.—A meeting of the committee on buildings and grounds of the city board of education was held in Clerk Judah's office on Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Veteran Firemen.—The regular monthly meeting of the Veterans' Volunteer Firemen's association will be held at fireman's hall, 271 Canyon road, at 8 p. m. Monday, March 5.

Hard Times Ball.—At the Salt Lake High school last night a hard times ball was given under the auspices of the sophomores. Many alumni were present as well as students from all the High school classes. Rag-bags had been largely drawn upon to furnish costumes.

Solar Phenomenon.—There was a curious solar phenomenon this morning, shortly after sunrise. The eastern horizon was cloudy, and peculiar nebulous conditions gave the appearance of two suns behind the clouds, about 20 degrees apart. This continued until the skies cleared up.

Willard Boon Improving.—Willard Boon, a Deseret News carrier in Murray, who was injured Monday last through colliding with a telegraph pole in leaving the Murray car with his papers, is reported as improving satisfactorily. He suffered a broken collar bone, and has since been confined to his bed while it has been repairing.

Los Angeles Man Buys.—There was recorded yesterday afternoon, the transfer to Joseph H. Hurd from William Quick, of the corner of First West and Fourth South streets, 810 rods for \$13,000. Mr. Hurd will make improvements. Peter Hark of Los Angeles, has bought from Mary A. Schoppe 11,115 feet on Fifth South street, between State and Main streets for \$5,000.

Millspaugh Named.—The name of Dr. J. P. Millspaugh, the first superintendent of Salt Lake City schools under the public school law, and now president of the California state normal school, was given the Los Angeles board of education in candidacy for the position of superintendent of the city schools. Dr. Millspaugh, however, says that this action was without his authority, and he is content to stay where he is.

The funeral will probably be held on Tuesday. For about two years Mr. Walker had been employed in the packing department of Z. C. M. L. He was married and leaves a wife and three children. Mr. Walker was a worker in the Tenth ward Church affairs and was one of the presidents of the Elders' quorum.

DIED IN CHICAGO.

Miss Lola Maddison of Salt Lake Passes Away Following Operation.

After an illness of three weeks, during most of which time she has been under treatment at a Chicago hospital, Miss Lola Maddison of this city died at 4:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Telegrams received during the afternoon by the family and immediate friends apprised them of the sad event, although they had been prepared for the news for several days, as Miss Maddison had been gradually sinking since undergoing an operation, from which she had not the strength to rally.

Miss Maddison was 25 years of age, and was a daughter of Mrs. Mary E. Maddison of Salt Lake. On hearing of her sudden illness, while visiting friends in Chicago, Miss Kathryn Maddison, a sister, left Salt Lake for Chicago, and was at her bedside when the end came. Miss Emma L. Maddison and Mrs. Edward M. Garnett, both sisters of the deceased, reside in Salt Lake, while a brother, E. H. Maddison, lives at Pocatello, and has been notified. He is expected to arrive here this afternoon, and will remain for the funeral services which will be held here at a date to be announced later.

Miss Kathryn Maddison left Chicago today, with the remains, and upon her arrival, the time for the funeral services will be announced.

ANOTHER PIONEER GONE.

Ely Ascroft Who Came Here in '45 Dead at Mapleton.

(Special to the "News.") Springfield, March 3.—Another pioneer of pioneers has gone to the great beyond in the death on March 1 of Ely Ascroft, at Mapleton, Utah. Mr. Ascroft was born in Louisville, Ky., in 1828. Two years before the pioneers came to Utah, Mr. Ascroft was in this country, and with others from Kansas City, who were after a band of outlaws. After the Saints began to settle the country in '47, he came here again and joined the Church in '54. He was a veteran of the Mexican and Black Hawk wars. He was the father of 13 children, and is survived by eight of them and a wife. His funeral will be held on Monday at the Mapleton ward house.
