

## PLANNED TO KILL REIGNING FAMILY

Investigation of Assassination of  
King Carlos and Prince  
Luis Smothered.

## GOVERNMENT TAKES STAND.

Would Prefer to Have All People Be-  
lieve There Was No General  
Uprising Against Dynamite.

Lisbon, Feb. 26.—The mystery be-  
hind the murder of King Carlos and  
Prince Luis is not likely ever to be  
completely lifted. The new Portu-  
guese government professes that the  
crime should be regarded both at  
home and abroad as the deed of in-  
dividuals carried away by the politi-  
cal passions of the moment, and inas-  
much as the republicans are so anx-  
ious to clear their skirts of responsi-  
bility for the regicide, both sides are  
glad to see an investigation which  
would probe the affair to the bottom,  
smothered. Yet there is undoubtedly  
much that could be cleared up.  
It is a matter of common knowledge  
that there were intrigues in high  
places as well as low before the trag-  
edy occurred and the rage of the leadi-  
ng republicans and the two "royal-  
ist" parties against which Premier  
Francisco and King Carlos were warring  
exceeded all bounds.

## LEADERS IN PLOT.

There is no suggestion that there  
was a repetition of the Bolgrade plot  
aimed at the king's person, but that  
some of the desperate political lead-  
ers were involved in the series of  
abortive plots against Francisco's life  
which preceded the murder is believed  
in well-informed circles here. Francis  
himself told a friend the day before  
he left Lisbon (virtually upon the or-  
der of the government) that it was  
impossible to reveal to the world what  
the enemies of the king and himself  
and therefore it was better for him  
to retire forever from the political  
arena.

thus frustrate the military support,  
which was counted upon to give suc-  
cess to the plot.

WOULD HAVE BEEN DIFFERENT.  
Notwithstanding the betrayal some  
of the advanced Republicans assert  
that if the active leaders confined in  
the Baxia fortress had been free that  
night in Lisbon, history would have  
told a different tale.

Whether the plot aimed at the mur-  
der of the entire royal family is also  
likely to remain in dispute, as the of-  
ficial view attempts to make it appear  
that Prince Luis was killed by a mis-  
take. This view, however, is not  
supported by the testimony of eye-  
witnesses. One of the most reliable  
witnesses, was standing in the arcade  
at the corner of Blackhorse square as  
the royal carriage approached. He  
stood with his shoulder against the  
shoulder of Boissac, the man who fired  
the shot that killed the king. As the  
carriage reached a point almost direct-  
ly opposite him, there was a report  
from the curb 30 or 40 feet behind the  
carriage. The tutor saw the king  
straighten up, but he had no idea that  
a shot had been fired or that the king  
was hit. Thinking the report was the  
report of firecrackers, he turned to the  
man at his side and said:

"Take off your hat. It is the king."

LUIS KILLED ASSASSIN.

The words were not out of his  
mouth before the man darted forward,  
revolver in hand, and running up to  
within five feet of the rear of the car-  
riage, fired point-blank. The king  
sank down, and his head fell forward.  
In the confusion which followed the  
tutor saw the man who had fired first  
kneeling in the street with a carbine  
at his shoulder, firing shots in rapid  
succession. The crown prince was on  
his feet as the king received the fatal  
bullet, and the tutor is certain that it  
was he who killed the murderer of his  
father. Boissac was shot from the front  
through the heart. Whether it was the  
crown prince's bullet which killed him  
or not, it is certain that the prince  
fired twice for two chambers of his  
revolver were emptied. Everything  
goes to prove that the plot was to kill  
the entire royal family, thus obliterat-  
ing the dynasty and precipitate a  
change in the regime.

"WAVE TUNER" INSTALLED.

Marvelous Wireless Instrument Placed  
At Point Loma Station.

San Diego, Cal., Feb. 25.—With  
the installation of a "wave tuner"  
a recent and wonderful in-  
vention in wireless telegraphy at  
Point Loma, the station is now not  
only one of the most powerful on the  
coast, but it is enabled to accomplish  
feats that no other station in the west  
is able to do. This instrument is  
operated in receiving messages. Its  
many adjustments enable the operator  
to prevent any interference and to en-  
tirely eliminate the disturbance known  
as atmospheric. Another accomplish-  
ment is that no matter how many other  
stations are operating, the man at the  
local station may select any station he  
chooses and receive the message that  
he desires without interference from  
any other.

## FRENCH POLICE TO ARREST ROY

Man Accused of Murder by His  
Wife to be Tried in  
Paris.

## PARENTS SEEK DIVORCE.

Antecedents of Alleged Slayer of Geo.  
Carkins Will Try to Sever Bonds  
With Glacita Calla.

Paris, Feb. 25.—The police of this city  
have received from New York a war-  
rant for the arrest of Paul Roy, on the  
charge of murder. This charge was  
made by Roy's wife, an American ac-  
tress, known as Glacita Calla, who de-  
clares that he murdered her brother,  
George A. Carkins, early in January, in  
New Hampshire. The warrant has not  
yet been served. The French law does  
not permit the extradition of French  
citizens, but provides for their trial  
and punishment in France for crimes  
committed abroad. Roy's brothers  
point out that his marriage to Miss  
Carkins is illegal in France, as he had  
not previously obtained the consent of  
his parents, and they say he will apply  
for a divorce in America on the ground  
that his wife misrepresented her age  
at the time of her marriage, swearing  
she was 27 when she was really 34 years  
old.

## CHARGE SELF-DEFENSE.

In addition to declaring that Paul  
Roy was forced to shoot Carkins in  
self-defense, the Roy family charge  
that the accusation of murder brought  
by Paul's wife is taken in a spirit of  
revenge because her husband informed  
her that he did not intend to return to  
America and henceforth would live in  
France. The Roy family tried desper-  
ately but unsuccessfully to prevent the  
marriage of their brother to Miss Car-  
kins. They besought him to return to  
France and see their mother, who was  
about to enter a private hospital.

The father of the accused man, Au-  
guste Roy, is a prominent merchant  
and lives at Neuilly. Miss Carkins lived  
in Paris several years ago with her  
aunt, the Baroness von Orndorff. She  
was at one time engaged to Count de  
Beyene. Her talent, wealth and beauty  
gave her access to exclusive circles.  
She finally rented a villa at Etretat and  
met Paul Roy, after which, according to  
her friends, her misery began.

## WILL NOT JEOPARDIZE LIVES.

Navy Department Receives Volunteers.  
However, for Turret Test.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Another candi-  
date who is willing to go into the turret  
of the monitor Florida when it is shot  
at by a shell from the Arkansas, ac-  
cording to the naval program, has sent  
his name to the navy department, al-  
though the officials decline to give his  
name or address. He prefers to enlist  
for the purpose for two weeks only,  
as he has a wife and two children to  
care for and when the test is over,  
wants to return to his usual occupa-  
tion. The department regards his offer as a  
commendable one, but the determina-  
tion has been reached not to put any  
human beings in the turret when the  
firing takes place.

## GOT MORE THAN PLENTY.

San Francisco, Feb. 25.—According to  
a story told in the Examiner this morn-  
ing, Miss Hazel Edwards and Miss M.  
Thames, young women tourists of New  
York, who made the trip to this city by  
way of the isthmus of Panama rather  
than by railroad, for "the novelty of  
the thing," had all the experience they  
looked for and a little more. They ar-  
rived here at the beginning of the week  
in the Pacific mail steamer Newport,  
and tell of having been arrested for  
spies by the chief of police of Guate-  
mala city. After being arrested at the  
hotel they were placed, they say, in the  
care of a matron in the prison and  
kept there nearly two days until the  
steamer Newport arrived.




BOARD OF TRADE BUILDING, CITY
