AN HISTORICAL PLACE SOLD.

J. P. Gammon Buys the "T. A. Ranch"-Scene of the "Cattle War" of 1892.

Buffalo, Wyo., March 16 .- The "T. A." ranch, one of the historical spots in northern Wyoming, has been sold by Dr. William Harris to J. P. Gammon of Spearfish, the price paid being about \$225,000. The "T. A." ranch was estab-lished by Dr. Harris in 1881. In the spring of 1892 it was the seat of the much exploited "Johnson County Cattle War." It was near this ranch that the citizens of Johnson county made a Inal stand against the invasion of the cattle kings, and it was here that Champion and Ray, alleged cattle rust-lers, were killed by the invaders, in a pitched battle that waged for several hours. The citizens were rapidly surrounding the invaders when the United States troops from Ft. McKinney, near here, now abandoned, came to their rescue and the cattlemen were taken pris oners and transported to Cheyenne, where they were kept in the "bull pen" until their cases were settled in th

courts. The new owner will move to the "T A" ranch with his family, and while the property is one of the best in this country, it will be still further improved by Mr. Gammon.
