

severance of Altona and St. Paul from the freeport territory of Wumburg. The committee moved that the House assent to the bill, with the proviso that a change of custom in the frontier stations on the Elbe, shall only be enacted by special laws. Bismarck said this proviso was an attempt at a pressure to which the Government could not submit. The Imperial Constitution was on the side of the Government and overrode the provincial law, which established customs in the frontier on the Elbe. The free port rights of Hamburg could not be withdrawn without Hamburg's own consent, but the federal council had the right to fix the boundary of free port territory. Bismarck regretted to say that particularism had reappeared with renewed strength; that constitutional disputes had been kindled for the first time in the Federal Council. He then referred to the opposition of the Catholic Centre. From them he had expected support; hence the concessions which were about to be submitted to the Prussian Diet. Opposition parties should beware of the consequences of their conduct. It was dangerous to sow discord between the Federal Governments. Only one thing, he said, retains me in office, namely, the will of the Emperor. When I see the obstacles I have to contend with, I feel a strong desire to retire. If you consider the powerful Centre unconquerable, I should advise you on my retirement to select a ministry representing both the Centre and Conservatives. I am tired, tired to death, when I see my efforts constantly thwarted by the Liberals who will not yield on the smallest points, when the continued existence of the empire is at stake.

Herr Windhorst replied. He said the Centre did not oppose the government from party motives. Bismarck alone can restore peace to the church, and if he does, he will obtain much which at present is unobtainable.

In the Reichstag also the anti-slavery bill and the bill for preventing the extending of the rinderpest were read a third time.

The House refused Herr Tasker permission to introduce a resolution declaring the attitude of Prussia in the St. Pauli affair unconstitutional.

The Havana Gazette to-day published the law for the abolition of slavery in Cuba, which comes in force from date, together with regulations for the application of the law. The regulations have been promulgated by order of the Governor General and approved by the council of administration, but are subject to the approval of the home government.

The inhabitants of Bitlis, Turkey, have revolted because the Governor had received orders to send all available serals to Van and Bash Kaleb, as telegrams from Erzraum stated that Van and Bash Kaleb were hopelessly famine stricken, and Bitlis was the nearest point whence assistance could be obtained. It is believed that the governor has connived at the resistance of his people, and the English and Russian embassies have complained to the Porte against him.

The Porte is engrossed with military preparations, and the governors of provinces have been ordered to hold reliefs for any emergency. Several thousand troops have arrived at Constantinople within the past week. There is great activity at the government arsenals in Asia.

The beetle which ravaged crops in Poltava and Ekaterinaslav in 1878, has been found in large numbers in Larvalstadt, and the peasants are sowing spring crops. The greatest alarm prevails in Tiflis in consequence of the discovery of locust eggs. Unless they are exterminated before development, famine throughout Caucassia is inevitable.

In the Spanish Chamber of Deputies to-day Senor Vivara called attention to a statement that an American steamer had been chartered for the purpose of conveying munitions of war to Cuba for the insurgents. The Minister of Justice replied that the representative of Spain at Washington possessed the confidence of the government and would do his duty to his country.

The American citizens in Peru claim, through the United States, indemnity from Chili for all losses and damages whatsoever they have suffered or may hereafter suffer through the acts of the Chilean forces. They protest against the manner in which Chili has proposed to carry on the war as inhuman and unworthy of a civilized nation.

A Paris dispatch says: The Irreconcilables have a project for organ-

izing a large demonstration at Pere la Chaise over the graves of the Communists who fell in May, 1871. Should they persevere in the scheme, the government will take measures to preserve order.

Gen. Chanzy, French ambassador to Russia, arrived at Berlin and had a conference with Bismarck.

A Geneva dispatch says: Part of the roof of St. Gothard tunnel, 6,300 meters from the south entrance, fell on Thursday, killing three workmen.

A Constantinople dispatch says: Sir Austen Layard recently made a communication to the Sultan which has produced in Turkish official circles the conviction that the British government will confine itself to insisting upon the complete execution of the Berlin treaty.

The Turkish council of war unanimously decides the assassin of Col. Commeroff is guilty. Sentence of death will be pronounced on Monday, and the prisoner will be executed in the course of a week.

St. PETERSBURG, 8. — A letter from Col. Prejevalsky, the Russian explorer, dated Si Ning, China, March 20, announces the safety of his expedition.

In the Spanish Chamber of Deputies, the minister of the colonies said the Captain-General of Cuba had been instructed to combine the necessary rigor of the law with humanity in dealing with the insurgents.

Heavy rains and slight frosts in several provinces of upper and lower Aragon, Spain, are causing serious damage to crops and vines.

An article published by you and headed "A Startling Decision," in the case of Heber Bankhead vs. the Union Pacific Railroad, as rendered by Judge Hunter, has opened the door to a state of things not to be tolerated. A poor man was deprived of his only team on Saturday morning last. After losing everything in the line of cattle and sheep, through a seven months' winter, then to lose the team of horses, was bread lost to him and little ones. They were turned out, and the train going east, and known here as the midnight train, drove them along the track, until reaching a culvert, both were killed. People living not over ten rods from the track and place stated were awakened by the whistling of the engine, and they declare the train could have been stopped and the horses saved. It is not very hard to stop on an up grade, and with clear moonlight. This startling decision is fresh in the minds of railroad men, and it is "go ahead—we pay for nothing." Charles Shill, of Croyden, U.T., reports his loss, and puts in a claim for \$300, but that decision stands in the way of justice, and years may elapse before he may get a cent. As before said, it is a question of bread with him.

You must pardon me. This question should not be left to stock men and farmers alongside of the road, as recommended in your paper. These men are citizens of the United States and taxpayers of Utah. The decision of Judge Hunter is an insult to the Territory of Utah, and should be prosecuted by the Territory. I offer no objection to co-operating together and close by saying, if you will open a defence fund, although one of the poor, put me down for five dollars, in the hope that justice may be done these men and others that may be called to suffer.

Editors Deseret News:

In the local column of your Wednesday evening's issue I find the following: "The 'Christy' vs. the 'Miner.' The preliminary suit instituted by the Christy Mining Company of Silver Reef, against the editors of the *Miner*, of that place, lasted seven days, and is said to be the longest preliminary examination ever held in this Territory."

I have no wish to detract anything from the *Miner*, nor yet to rob the examining magistrate of Silver Reef of any glory he may have achieved in his lengthy and doubtless able investigations, nor would I once hint that it might have been consummated in less time. On the contrary I am well

aware that suits involving locality and rights of mines are very intricate and not only take time, but their true merits are often hard of solution.

My point is to defend my constituents against the *Miner's* claim for Silver Reef to the longest preliminary examination ever held in this Territory. You say it is not done with yet. Well sir, it may in the end beat Beaver, and the Reef magistrate may yet take the belt from our Boreman, but if he does, he has yet three weeks to sit.

In the land jumping murder case examined by Judge Boreman, to which I have but recently referred through your valuable paper, where, in the real case was land jumpers vs. the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, the examination lasted just about one month from day to day, Sundays excepted. I do not recollect that a single week day was lost in the time. I hope the *Miner* will be honorably acquitted as the Church was, and if any innocent dying man is accused, he will not die under bonds as one man did in the case referred to.

I trust I shall be pardoned for vindicating the right of our judge to the honor of the longest and most tedious, one-sided, preliminary examination ever held in this Territory. I honestly think him justly entitled to it.

A newspaper reporter has been going through the records and comparing them with the list of marriages, and finds that the sum of \$9,100 is due the county for neglect of the law.
