

"A remarkable occurrence took place at the Blue Ridge Tunnel last night. The third set of workmen were engaged in digging as usual, when one of them, (Pat Flagan) noticed that the texture of the rock before him changed suddenly from hard to soft, and the soft was wet. Shortly after a stream of water issued from an orifice he had made. This was succeeded by a heavy rumbling sound 'like the cars,' which so frightened the hands that they all made for the open air. Well was it for them that they did so! The sound continued to grow louder and louder for some minutes, till a crash was heard, and immediately a vast stream of water rolled out of the tunnel. An eye-witness says that the head of the stream was at least ten feet high, and that it swept carts and barrows before it 'like chaff.'

The stream continued to pour a perfect river till 12 o'clock, when it gradually subsided, and was low enough at 3 p. m. to allow us to make a hasty survey of its cause. It seems that there is, in the middle of the mountain, an immense cavern or pocket, in which water from the melting snow has been deposited for years, and that the line of the tunnel taps this cavern near its centre. The cavern is of immense extent, and will save the State a good deal of money, since nature has opened a road through near three hundred feet of solid rock."

**VICE'S WIND MILL.**—The Rochester Daily Advertiser of July 2, says: 'It gives us much pleasure to announce the success of the Prairie Flouring Mills, propelled by wind, under the patent of our old townsman T. C. Vice. Mr. William D. Snow having purchased half the patent, has been industriously engaged on the western prairies in organizing companies for the erection of flour mills of two run of stones.'

The erection of one at Bromfield, Illinois, has fully tested their utility, and visited by hundreds. It is just what is required for that section, and contracts for thirty-one mills, at \$6,000 each, have been sealed, to be finished, at January next. Several are also being erected in Canada. Several of our Rochester mechanics are engaged in their construction in Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota.

**COMBUSTION OF THE DIAMOND BY A NEW METHOD.**—A new method of burning the diamond has been recently adopted by Mr. Lock, lecturer on Chemistry at the Cincinnati Medical College. The diamond is placed in a jar of oxygen, and a jet of hydrogen is allowed to play upon it until heated to the proper temperature. Then the hydrogen is shut off and the diamond supports its own combustion, which sometimes continues ten or twelve minutes. The carbonic acid is removed by means of an air pump, and its identity with that from other sources is proved by the usual method.—[Ex.]

**RETURN OF THE JEWS TO PALESTINE.**—At the Annual Meeting of the London Society for Promoting Christianity among the Jews, the Earl of Shaftesbury stated that, being no longer under the seal of secrecy, he might declare that as long as two years ago a dispatch from the Foreign Office, written with Lord Clarendon's own hand, had been sent to Constantinople, urging upon the representative of the British Empire to do all that lay in his power to effect the emancipation of the Jews, allowing them to hold land and to enjoy every civil privilege in Palestine.—[Ex.]

**THE SOURCES OF THREE OF OUR PRINCIPAL RIVERS.**—The sources of the Mississippi and St. Lawrence are said to be within a stone's throw, and the Missouri, a tributary of the former river, and the Columbia, have an origin not a mile apart. Here, then, are three of our principal streams, diverging in almost as opposite directions as is possible, and yet it requires but a slight change of the wind, or increased breeze, to determine that the descending shower shall fall into the one instead of another of these great water-courses.—[Ex.]

**CURIOUS INVENTION.**—A very curious invention has been made in England. Its object is the manufacture of picture-frames, and other articles of like description out of bricks; and, singularly enough, such an object as this has been successfully accomplished. It is done, as we understand, by reducing pieces of old bricks to powder, mixing this powder with some portion of the tar or refuse of the gas-works, and then compressing this mixture into suitable molds. The result is said to be a solid durable, and beautiful article, of almost any given pattern.—[Ex.]
