

LAWMAKERS' WORK.

SALARIES COMMITTEE REPORTS A STATE AND COUNTY SALARIES BILL.

GOT WELL'S RECOMMENDATION,

REGARDING FUTURISTIC CHILDREN—Bill for Municipal Elections this Fall.—Public Library Bill.

There was a busy and interesting time in both branches of the state legislature, the most notable feature being the fire and police bill in the House and the introduction of the county officers' salaries bill in the Senate. A resolution was introduced exempting off the introduction of new bills after the 10th day—March 21—except by consent of two-thirds of the members in the branch in which the introduction is made. The session of the day was truncated as follows:

SENATE.

The committee on judiciary recommended the passage of S. B. 101, to provide immediate time, calling the session of information for publication.

The majority of the committee on education reported adversely to H. B. 45, "Altitude's education bill," and the legislation was laid over.

The committee on public works and transportation reported a bill to amend the law relating to the use of wagons, which was referred to H. B. 12, State Auditor's bill, and the bill was referred without amendment.

The committee on agriculture recommended a substitute to H. B. 101, which was referred to the bill.

The committee on manufactures recommended the passage of H. B. 45, for the regulation of wages and hours.

The committee on manufacturers and commerce recommended the bill to regulate the hours of labor.

The committee on manufacturers and commerce reported favorable to the passage of H. B. 74, grant of dairy products.

The committee on agriculture recommended the passage of H. B. 101, relating to wages. It is the same general system as at present, with some necessary modifications.

PAEDIATRIC CHILDREN.

A message was received from Dr. Wells, announcing his approval of H. B. 45, "Altitude's education bill," or a compromise bill relative to certain cases.

The attorney called attention to the fact that the question of polygamy, being settled, it would be in harmony with the majority of the legislature, and the committee, but that it would be a year before the legislature of the state could give the legislature the authority of taking a vote.

The motion of H. B. 45, was referred to the judiciary committee to report a bill.

HOME INSTITUTE GOVERNESS.
