

BOISE MINING CONGRESS OVER.

Butte Selected as the Place for the Next Meeting.

OHIO MAN GETS PRESIDENCY

Resolutions Adopted Authorizing Subordinate Branches to Disseminate Mining Information.

Butte, Ida., July 25.—The morning session of the Mining congress was devoted to the presentation of papers. Professor Londerbach, of Nevada, read a paper on the geology of that state. Dr. Howarth presented one on the geology of Kansas. W. R. Everett, one on "Honest Methods of Promotion," and J. J. Deming, of Idaho, one on "Stamp Mill Construction."

At the afternoon session of the congress the election of officers and the selection of the place for the next meeting were taken up. Butte and Los Angeles were named as the place of meeting, also Portland, Ore., the latter afterwards being withdrawn. In presenting the claims of Butte, Mrs. Ella Knowles Haskell made an eloquent speech, in the course of which she said:

"If you will come to Butte we will present to you the keys of two cities—one above ground and one 8,000 feet below. We will show you a nature's treasure house—the richest spot on the face of the earth. We will show you the greatest mining plants on the face of the earth. I have to say to you that Butte has four transcontinental lines—come any way you will, you may come straight through to Butte."

"I understand the city selected must deposit \$3,000 inside of thirty days. Butte wants you and, if necessary, she will deposit \$30,000 within three days. In behalf of the people of the great state of Montana, of the gigantic mining interests of Butte, in behalf of the people, the business men of all the people, I invite you to meet next year in Butte—nestling at the feet of the grandest range of mountains on this continent. We will tender you the most royal welcome."

A ballot resulted 80 to 41 in favor of Butte, and the choice was made unanimously.

The committee on permanent organization reported a number of recommendations, among them the following: "In future only such as have fully paid all dues up to the annual meeting of 1902 (payable in advance) shall be eligible to vote upon any question relative to officers and organization."

"Future meetings shall be held beginning the first Tuesday in October and continue not to exceed five days."

"The following committee to draft constitution and by-laws to present to the next meeting: Colonel Thomas H. Shaffer, of California; J. T. Grayson, of Oregon; third vice president, Clarence E. Allen, Utah; secretary, Irwin Mahon, Pennsylvania; treasurer, E. C. Camp, Tennessee; sergeant-at-arms, W. H. White, Massachusetts."

These were adopted excepting that in relation to officers.

For president, L. Bradford Prince, of New Mexico, and E. L. Shaffer, of Nevada, O., were nominated. Shaffer was chosen by a vote of 65 to 41 and in motion of Prince his election was made unanimous.

Other officers chosen as follows: Vice president, Major Fred R. Red, Boise; secretary, Irwin Mahon, Pennsylvania; treasurer, E. C. Camp, Knoxville, Tenn.

A number of resolutions were adopted, the most important of which was the following:

"Whereas, The primary and most important purposes of this congress are to inaugurate a movement that will ultimately result in the establishment of the national government of a bureau or department of mining, and to bring before the people of the United States, and present to them in form such information upon that question as will convince them of the great importance of the movement, and

"Whereas, In order to successfully disseminate this information, subordinate branches of this congress should be created in all states of the union in order that through these subordinate branches this work may be carried out under the directions of the international congress; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That steps should be taken at this meeting of the international mining congress to properly and systematically inaugurate this movement. And further, be it

"Resolved, That the president of this congress be, and is hereby authorized and directed to appoint, either before or after the adjournment of this meeting, a committee of five members, to be known as the organizer of subordinate branches of this congress. The name to be done until said articles of confederation are formed and adopted under the direction of the president and secretary of the international mining congress."

The convention adjourned sine die. Tonight the delegates are attending a reception given in their honor by the citizens at the natatorium.

CHARGED WITH BIGAMY.

Henry H. Piggott Placed Under Arrest at Fort Collins, Colo.

Fort Collins, Colo., July 25.—Henry H. Piggott, formerly a well known Philadelphia lawyer, and prominent in financial circles of that city, has been placed under arrest here charged with bigamy. Piggott married his niece, Charlotte R. Garre, in Denver, in February last and they have been living on a stock ranch near this city. He claims he was divorced from his Philadelphia wife in Boston, Mass.

Civil actions against both Piggott and the Garre woman, one for separate maintenance, and the other for alleged alienation of affection, which in the sum of \$50,000, have been begun.

DON'T AGREE WITH KOCH.

Ithaca, N. Y., July 25.—James Law, director of the New York state veterinary college of Cornell university, gave out an interview last night in which he declared that he did not wholly agree with Prof. Koch in his conclusion that bacillus which was found in cattle could not be transferred to human kind. The Cornell professor said in regard to the dissemination of human and bovine tuberculosis that it is very clear that bacillus tuberculosis as grown or cultivated in the human body and bodies acquires qualities that are characteristic of different habits, but that it is too early to take the absolute position attributed to Dr. Koch in a cablegram, that bacillus in man being in artificial media follows that found in the other. It has been shown that cultivation of human bacillus in codon capsules in the abdomen of a chicken adapts itself after a time to the conditions of life in the fowl, so that it infects the fowl promptly and extensively. Taking into account the fact that the growth of tuberculosis bacillus of a chicken, of a cow and of a man being in artificial media follows the same course in all cases, and that the products of one bacillus may be used as effectively as those of another in testing for tuberculosis the presumption is altogether in favor of primary fundamental identity. They have simply acquired new habits by living in a particular genus.

TO STUDY WESTERN FLORA.

Chicago University Botanists Start on Tour August 6.

Chicago, July 25.—Botanists of the University of Chicago will start August 6 for a two months' tour of study of the flora and forestry of the West. In a private car equipped with every facility for experiment and work they will make their first pause in the pineries of northern Minnesota, where their car can be side tracked at will.

The tour has been arranged so that indefinite stops can be made at more than fifty favorable places already selected on account of the peculiarly interesting character of the locality and its influences upon rare plants and forest growths. Two weeks will be passed at Flathead lake. Thence the route lies to Lake McDonald where recently many uncatalogued floral specimens have been found. Lower Idaho, the valley of the Columbia river and the Puget sound region are next on the list of places to be visited.

The giant red woods of California, the irrigated fruit farms of the black lands of Ventura and San Diego counties on the coast, the phenomenal luxuriance of the watered oases of the deserts of Arizona and New Mexico, also to be visited, which is believed, yield information of new and great value to the scientific world.

The party will be in charge of Prof. Cowles. Among those going are: F. O. Grover, Oberlin college; R. A. Campbell, Elgin academy; W. B. McCullum, Armour institute; H. M. Whitford, University of Chicago; Prof. University of Chicago; I. B. Myers, Chicago institute; J. M. Westgate, Kansas State Agricultural college.

CLARK IS AFTER RUSSIAN MINES.

The Montana Senator Himself Confirms the Rumor.

San Francisco, July 25.—United States Senator Clark of Montana is here in connection with the construction of the Salt Lake, San Pedro & Los Angeles railroad, which he says will be completed as rapidly as possible. He confirms the truth of a recent report that he is negotiating for a rich copper mining concession in Siberia. One of his agents is now investigating the property.

BIDS FOR OATS FOR MANILA.

Seattle, Wash., July 25.—Major George Ruhlman, the local quartermaster, acting under instructions from the quartermaster general will today advertise for bids for the contract to furnish the government with 4,000 tons of oats for shipment to Manila.

Bids for the contract will be opened by Major Ruhlman on July 30. The specifications require that the oats shall be delivered at either Seattle or Tacoma, at the option of the quartermaster on or before August 15.

RICH STRIKE NEAR NOME.

It is in Fairhaven District and Causes a Big Stampede.

Seattle, Wash., July 25.—The steamship Nome City arrived this morning from Nome. Passengers report a rich strike in the Fairhaven district, ninety miles north of Nome, and say a stampede has occurred from Nome. The Bluestone district is still frozen, and it will be some weeks before miners will be able to commence striking. The Kogarcok district is also backward, and 1,500 men are in Teller City waiting for the season to open. Over \$200,000 has been struck from winter dumps, near Nome.

SEVENTH NATIONAL BANK.

While Federal Grand Jury Investigates, Directors Decide to Recognize.

W. E. D. Stokes, a Stockholder, Lodges a Complaint Against Directorate.

New York, July 25.—With the federal grand jury in session on the investigation of their affairs, the board of directors of the Seventh National bank met today and decided upon a plan for the reorganization of the defunct bank. The capital stock is to be increased from \$500,000 to \$2,500,000 and the additional issue of \$2,000,000 in stock will be sold at \$1.30 per share, with first purchase privilege to the present stockholders.

The cash proceeds of the assessment on the existing stock and the sale of new stock will, it is claimed, pay all present obligations and completely restore solvency. Existing stockholders are to be required to pay the assessment ordered by the controller of the currency. Edward R. Thomas, Edward Gould, William Nelson Cromwell, Frank Ray, William H. Taylor and Edmund K. Stashe have been constituted a committee of subscribers with plenary power to carry out the plan. They are to receive subscriptions and represent the stockholders in all matters relating to the bank and receivership. The present directors and officers are required to tender their resignations and a majority under the new subscription will elect their successors. The plan is made binding upon all subscribers when 9 per cent of the new stock is subscribed and 90 per cent of the assessment is paid.

A subscription form embodying the main features of plan of reorganization was also drawn up and approved. A substantial amount of new stock has already been subscribed.

United States District Attorney Henry L. Burnett says the plan to reorganize the seventh national bank will not affect the investigation by the federal grand jury.

William E. D. Stokes, who is a stockholder of the Seventh National bank, has taken out summons in the supreme court against the directors of the bank. President Thomas and Receiver Raynor. The complaint charged the directors with making reports to the stockholders to the effect that the condition of the bank was unimpaired, when as a matter of fact it was already insolvent. It further charges that the directors "utterly failed and neglected to perform their official duties," that they "suffered and permitted the accounts of said bank to be kept in an inaccurate manner, which failed to show the true character of its affairs."

In the complaint the directors are further charged with having employed incompetent persons as officers of the bank, "who were unable to properly and efficiently discharge their duties, all of which was well known to the directors."

After having further charged them with having given loans to insolvent persons and corporations, without adequate and valid securities, the complaint goes on:

"That said directors defendants so negligently and carelessly conducted the said bank and the business and affairs thereof, and the entire capital and surplus and much of the property and effects thereof have been lost and stock of the said bank rendered worthless and the stockholders thereof rendered liable for a large sum of money on account of the debts of said bank remaining unpaid."

The plaintiff then demanded judgment for the total amount of his loss as a stockholder of the bank, and the cost of the suit.
