#### Cloakmakers May Strike.

New York, July 26.—A general strike of the cloakmakers of Greater New York may be ordered after a meeting of the executive committee of the cloaknakers union to be held tonight. Five hundred struck yesterday at one es-tablishment demanding a recognition of the union and the reinstatement of a number of discharged fellow workers And as a result of a strike among the button makers of the city, 5,000 cloak makers are now idle. It is estimated that if a general cloakmakers' striks is ordered 17,000 will walk out.

A meeting attended by 10,600 garment workers was held last night in Hamil-ton Fish park for the purpose of adopting resolutions of sympathy with the striking garment workers. Flery speeches were made and at first it looked as if there might be trouble with the police, but the meeting finally be-came orderly and broke up without tak-ing any special action with regard to the strike.

MILD BUBONIC PLAGUE CASE.

Dr. Doty Says Such is One on the Hohenfels.
