Death of Moritz Wolf.—William Wolf of this city received a dispatch last evening telling him of the death of his father, Moritz Wolf, in Chicago, at the age of 86.

Hopper's First Walk.—Norman C. Hopper is now up and around, and is strutting around town yesterday, shaking hands with friends. Hopper says he hardly knows the town, so big and busy has it grown while he was sick.

Train Checks at Ogdén.—The stormy autumn broke up the train at Ogdén last night so tickets were returned to be used this evening, when the children's ball, the "Mikado" scene, and other interesting features will be given.

Hick Files Resignation.—Ogden Hick has filed his resignation as candidate on the "American" ticket for district judge, with Secretary of State Fingy. The name of W. H. Fingy will be substituted for that of Judge Hick.

G. A. R. Vets Entertained.—The board of governors of the Commercial club entertained at lunch yesterday 15 G. A. R. veterans who attended the Toledo encampment and brought back the 1909 encampment in the gripsacks.

**CAR ACCIDENTS
THING OF PAST**

Salt Laker Patents a Couple of
Inventions Which Will
Stop Them.

NEW AUTOMATIC BRAKES.

In Case a Train Breaks in Two on
Steep Incline There Will be No
Smashup.

Another Salt Lake man has stepped to the front with a couple of inventions which bid fair to revolutionize the air and clamp brake equipment on railroad cars. The man is Knut W. Carlgren, a locksmith of this city, and his inventions comprise an automatic air coupling device, and a system of mechanism by which, in case of accident, breaking away from a train of heavily loaded freight cars, the brakes are automatically applied, and the cars stop within the distance of its own length from the place it breaks away.

Mr. Carlgren's inventions have both been patented. The car brake patent was issued July 21 of the present year, and the air coupling device on Aug. 11. It is claimed for the car brake that it will stop the largest and most heavily loaded car by automatic application of the brakes within the distance of its own length on a 20 per cent grade, and a working model of the invention, now on exhibition at the office of B. Clegg, 411 Auerbach building, demonstrates the correctness of the claim. There are two models of the car brake, one a truck, loaded proportionately heavy, and at as great an incline as the wheels of the car can be prevented from sliding, the brakes are applied when the truck breaks loose and is stopped in an incredibly short distance.

SIMPLE MECHANISM.

In the case of the air pipe coupling device, the mechanism is very simple, yet very effective. The coupling works automatically and connects the steam or air pipes the moment the cars are coupled, and automatically disconnects the pipes when the cars are uncoupled. The device is adapted to be applied to the standard air or steam pipes now in use, obviates the necessity for going in between the cars to couple up the pipes, and it is claimed that its application to present systems with comparatively small cost. The coupling is produced by means of a rotating tube equipped with curved fingers which upon pressure of the cars coming together are forced together and interlocked, thus completing the connection. A working model of this invention may also be seen in the Auerbach building.

A feature of the car brake is that it may be made to work whether the car is going forward or backward, or may be thrown off entirely at will. The inventor, Mr. Carlgren, came to America from Sweden 25 years ago. He located in Salt Lake City when first coming to the country, and has been a resident of this city ever since. He is a gun and locksmith by trade, modest in demeanor, and of himself makes no great parade over the two inventions which are certainly moves in mechanical progress calculated to save time, labor, life and property. He has been working on the inventions about two years, and is happy to see success crown his efforts. He has received very flattering letters from scientific men who have examined his patents, and many local railroad men, and others, pronounce them marvelous and predict for them a certain success.
