

MORE WHOPPERS.—"Salt Lake, April 17.—A few red hot Mormons claim entire rule over all opposition to the church, and declare for the banishment of all leading Gentiles and Apostates."

"Salt Lake, April 19.—A Gentile was outrageously abused by a party of Mormon policemen, one of whom threatened to cut his heart out. There was a general excitement among the Gentiles, who armed themselves, and for awhile a serious collision was imminent."

THE MORMON CASES.—Washington April 15.—The Supreme Court of the United States this morning unanimously reversed the judgment of the Supreme Court of Utah in the Mormon test case, Englebrecht vs. Clinton. It held that the jury was unlawfully drawn, the summonses invalid, the indictments violations of the law, and that all proceedings must be dismissed. This decision quashes all the criminal business in the Utah courts last year, and renders civil judgments invalid where contested. It is decided that the Marshal of the United States in the Territory has only the same authority as in the State, consequently the Mormon murder indictments are personal trespasses. Criminal proceedings can only be commenced *de novo* under the United States law. The entire judicial decision of Judge McKean is overthrown.—Chicago Post.

ORDERS.—All persons who issue orders for merchandise should remember that they are illegal if unstamped, and the issuers are finable. Each order should bear a five cent stamp, and parties issuing orders are required to make monthly returns to the assistant assessor, and pay one-twelfth of one per cent additional on their circulation.

She died in full hope of rising with the just in the morning of the first resurrection.—Com.
