COPPER REMAINS STRONG. James A. Pollock & Company re-ceived the following Boston note over their private wires Saturday afternoon: A leading metal interest says: "The eyes of this world are at present cen-tred on Wall street. Leading manu-factures have secured sufficient copper to last them through June, and before committing themselves heavily beyond that time they propose to watch the de-velopments in the stock market. While security values are declining. I do not look to see any concerted heavy buying movement in copper, but on the other hand in an intervening dull period prices for the metal will not depreciate. It may become about that small hold-ers of copper will become frightened concerning the business outlook and shade quotations somewhat but this will prove temporary. Our London ad-vices just received indicate a healthy position for the metal abroad but buy-ers there, as here, will away further developments.
