LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Brigham Young Family Association will meet at the residence of Blanche Walter Beattie on Friday evening.

Boys have been out coasting with carts on C street, between Eighth and Fifth streets, to the danger of pedestrians, and the police have been called on to stop it.

Inquiry is being made as to the whereabouts of Guy R. Prentice, a railway mail clerk on the Lincoln-Billings run over the Burlington. He seems to have disappeared.

Walter D. Shaugnessy, son of ex-U. S. Marshal Shaugnessy, has been appointed a paymaster in the navy by Secretary Morton. The new appointee is 23 years old, and a graduate of the Belmont military academy.

The semi-annual meeting of the Women's Home Missionary society of this city, will be held tomorrow, in the First Baptist church, beginning at 11 a. m. Officers for the ensuing term will be chosen, and reports read.

Lightning struck the high tension wires between Ogden and Weber canyon at 7:30 last evening, putting out of commission for a while several transformers at Ogden, and causing a disturbance in the service in this city for half an hour.

THOUSANDS HONOR PRESIDENT KELLY

Respect Felt for the Deceased
Strikingly Attested at Services
Held Yesterday

IN BRIGHAM CITY TABERNACLE.

Line of March Strewed With Flowers
By the Little Folks—Speakers
Pay High Tribute.

Brigham City, Boxelder Co., April 26.—One of the most impressive and best attended funerals in the history of Boxelder county, was held today at Brigham City, when the citizens turned out en masse to do honor to the memory of the late President Charles Kelly of the Boxelder Stake of Zion, and to perform for him the last and funeral ceremonies.

The morning dawned with clouded sky, the heavens were overcast and ominous of rain, but ere long the clouds lightened, the sun appeared, and the elements were propitious for the occasion. From early dawn the streets of Brigham City were astir with numerous concourses of visitors, citizens, and friends, assembled from far and near, to do honor to the occasion. For several miles the heroic struggle of President Kelly against the ravages of disease, and his unflinching courage, as he fought, less faded death, and alone fought out the battle, had awakened in the people, sympathy, and the loyalty and love of the entire people had followed him, from a moment when he underwent a most terrible operation, until the time when he closed his eyes in death. His friends fondly hoped that he would yet live and be spared many years, but it was not to be.

His activities and zealous service in the cause of truth, from early manhood until the end, were well and favorably known to the people, and there are many hearts made desolate, and many homes filled with anguish, at the thought of their irreparable loss; for a great, good, and noble man has been torn from our midst, a man true and honest, E. PREST. FRANCIS M. LYMAN.

President Francis M. Lyman then spoke of the condition of the spirits of those who were called to pass to the other world. He said that death was a calamity to those who are left behind to mourn, but not to the good man fully prepared to die who has finished his mission on earth. The hand of death closed his eyes, and he is now a key stone affixed to the arch of life by the death angel, our life then becomes a completed structure, we pass to a state of rest and happiness in the paradise of God. President Kelly has run a good race, he has kept the faith, he has endured to the end, and for him there is laid up a crown of life.

PRESIDENT MIDDLETON.

President C. F. Middleton bore testimony from personal experience that President Kelly was a true and faithful servant of the Lord and interested in all that pertained to the interest of the Saints in the Boxelder stake of Zion.

The choir then sang an anthem "I receive a welcome home." Benediction was pronounced by Elder Seymour B. Young.

After the services the mourners and congregation filed out and took up the line of march to the cemetery where the grave was consecrated and dedicated and the remains of President Kelly were consigned to their last resting place.

The line of march after the interment, was taken up again from the cemetery to the residence of the deceased, where the people gathered again to their homes. The most perfect order prevailed throughout the ceremony, and it was an occasion long to be remembered in the Boxelder stake of Zion.

SUDDEN DEATH.

The people of Brigham City were shocked last Monday evening by the sudden death of Mr. John Christensen, the well known Brigham City merchant, familiarly termed "Honest John." The deceased gentleman was feeling a little indisposed on Monday, but nothing serious was anticipated, but at 8 o'clock p. m. he suddenly passed away. His death will take place on Thursday at 2:30 p. m. at the Second ward meetinghouse at Brigham City.
