

STEVE ADAMS' TRIAL HAS BEGUN

Jury Secured and Prosecution Makes Statement of What it Expects to Prove.

THAT HE MURDERED TYLER.

Defendant's Confession, With Other Evidence, Will be Relied on to Prove Case Against Him.

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 5.—A Bathurst special to the Spokesman-Review says the jury to try Steve Adams for the alleged murder of Fred Tyler in the Marble Creek country of Shoshone county, Idaho, three years ago, was completed this afternoon. Clarence Darrow, leading counsel for the defense, entered objection to the state's having 10 peremptory challenges, saying the law giving the state this privilege was passed after Adams was tried once, and was ex post facto. The objection was overruled.
