KILLED BY SNOWSLIDES.

Three Men Lose Their Lives Near Custer, Idaho-One Narrowly Escapes.

There have been unusually heavy snowstorms and consequent snow. slides in central Idaho, attended by some loss of life. Four men were covered up in the snow recently near Custer, only one, Engene Trueski, escaping with his life. The others were Thomas and John Davis and Silas Romer, the latter being an old time scout and trapper, and he may not be found until the snow melts in the spring. Traffic is temporarily blocked by snow between Custer and Challis.

A Boise dispatch of the 24th inst. says: A snowslide occurred today about 17 miles west of Huntington and five miles east of Durkee that delayed the eastbound passenger. The wreck-ing crew left early this afternoon for the scene of the slide and it is expected to have the track cleared soon.

WILL AUDIT COUNTY BOOKS

Commission Proposes to Know How Ac. counts of Department Heads Are Kept.

A resolution has been passed by the county commissioners providing for the examination of all the books and accounts of the county officials by an expert accountant. The statute provides that the books shall be examined every six months if the commissioners deem it necessary. As all of the coun-ty officials go out of office the last of this year, unless re-elected, it was thought advisable to have all the books

CEDED TO UNCLE SAM.

State of Utah Relinquishes All Right To Fort Douglas Reservation.

The deed by which the State of Utah ceded to the United States the Fort Douglas military reservation containing 9,196 acres of land, has been signed by Governor Wells and Secretary of State Hammond, and the great seal of the state has been affixed to the document. The deed was drafted by order of the secretary of war, and, after citing the act of the Legislature giving the governor power to cede the land, it is as follows:

Whereas, The United States now owns and holds as a site for the military post of Fort Douglas, Utah, and needful purposes connected therewith, lands aggregating about 9,196 acres, reserved from the public domain, and ac-quired by purchase on various dates, situated in the county of Salt Lake and State of Utah, and known collectively as the Fort Douglas military geserva-

tion; and, Whereas, application has been made to the governor of the State of Utah by the United States of America, represented by William H. Taft, secretary of war, for the cession to the United States of jurisdiction over said reserva-tion, as contemplated by article 1, section 8, clause 17, of the Constitution of

DAVENPORT IS COMING.

Clever Cartoonist Will Lecture Under Auspices of the Press Club.

The Press club closed a contract last vening for the visit of Homer Davenport, America's celebrated cartoonist, on Sunday evening, March 6. He will lecture at the Salt Lake theater on "The Power of the Cartoon."

Few westerners are not familiar with Davenport's work. He it was who first dressed Mark Hanna in the dollar-mark suit, although for years prior to the time Hanna became so conspicuous Davenport and his pen had fought Collis P. Huntington, and the Southern Pacific-and fought them flercely. His work in San Francisco attracted great attention and soon he was assigned to Hearst's New York Journal. His marvelous political cartoons gave Davenport a national reputation. Hearst paid him an enormous salary, having to keep higher bidders away from his discovery almost continually.

A short while ago Davenport tired of the metropolis and the work. Being in. dependently wealthy when his contract with the Journal expired, he would not it, preferring the platform. renew is making his western tour under the direction of the Paul Pond bureau, and the Press club put up a stiff guarantee to get the lecturer.

Y. M. C. A. WORK.

Lecturer Hodge Gives Interesting Talk in First Congregational Church.

The directors of the Y. M. C. A. met yesterday afternoon at the Commercial club, with Lecturer G. B. Hodge of the international assiciation, to talk over the possibilities of night school work for young men and boys in this city The visitor urged the making of every possible provision in the new association building for that class of also, that dormitory provision be made to accommodate the floating population of young men who would thus be brought under Christian influences.

The evening lecture in the First Con gregational church was largely attend ed, the speaker illustrating his principal points with a stereopticon. In hi In his ecture, Mr. Hodge called attention to the fact that the evening schools of the Y. M. C. A. are of greater significance than is usually understood. He said there are now 340 associations con-

ducting evening schools, with pupils ranging from 14 to 50 years of age, four-fifths of whom are day workers. These are given instruction by 1,400 teachers on 50 different subjects. The average age of the young men students is 22 years, and the attendance includes men from over 200 lines of occupation, of 30 different nationalities, and college graduates as well as men experienced in business affairs.

The lecture of Mr. Hodge was listened to with much interest, and Secretary Cox of the Salt Lake Y. M. C. A. is much encouraged by the visit. He be-lieves that when the new building is up, a great and valuable feature may be made of the evening class work.
