INDIANS SAID TO HAVE KILLED COWBOYS.

Sturgis, S. D., Oct. 25.-It is an-nounced that troops have been hurriedly started from Fort Meade to reinforce the soldiers at Fort Robinson, who have surrounded the rebellious Ute Indians in Wyoming. A telegram to headquarters says five cowboys have to headquarters says five cowboys have been killed and a big beef herd raided. Six troops of the Sixth cavalry have left Fort Meade, and will go 135 miles to Wyonning. There are but two troops of the Tenth cavalry at Fort Robinson, and it is considered unwise to attempt to force the reds until reinforcements come.

### TUBERCULOSIS PATIENTS.

#### In Near Future People May be Vaccinated to Prevent It.

Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 26 .- Dr. R. P. Ravenel, assistant director of the Henry Phipps institute for the study of tuberculosis at . Philadelphia, made made some interesting statements yesterday in an address on "Hereditary Portals Entry of Infection and Immunity in Tuberculosis." Dr. Ravenel said it was reasonable to expect that in the near future persons would be vaccinated to Take them immune from tuberculosis. He said nothing has done so much harm in the effort to prevent tubercu-losis as the belief by many that it is in the family and that there is no use to fight against it. The speaker stated that 90 per cent of all persons upon whom post mortem examinations have been made have scars on their lungs lungs

Washington, Oct. 25 .- Secy Root has requested the Japanese government to cause the arrest and punishment of Japanese poachers who attempted to land on the Sal Islands of Alaska re-cently, and who escaped to Japan after some of their party had been killed. The state department basis for this request is found in the fact that it regards the attempted landing of the poachers as an invasion of United States territory.

They fought with broad swords and each sustained

Poey,who was at one time alde-de-camp to ex-President Palma, because of an alleged personal insult during a political dis-cussion. In this fight Capt. Poey was badly wounded by a sword thrust in the leg.

## DARING ATTEMPT TO LIBERATE PRISONERS.

New York, Oct. 25.-A daring attempt to liberate 15 prisoners from Harlem jail was frustrated today, but not until one keeper had been so seriously heaten that he mad die and another sustained

that he had use and serious bruises. Henry Curtin, a prisoner who gained the confidence of the prison officials and had been permitted unusual liber-ties about the prison is charged with being the leader of the outbreak and inflicting the injuries upon the prison guards. Curtin had been detailed as a watchman on one of the upper tiers. As Edward M. Cuskler, one of the reg-ular keepers reached the third tier on one of the regular hourly rounds, Curone of the regular hourly rounds, Cur-tin sprang from a dark corner and struck him over the head with a wrench. Cuskey fell to the floor and Curtin ran to the cell of Albert Langler, another prisoner, and attempted to open the door. While he was strug-gling with the lock the keeper recov-ered consciousness and attacked Curtin from behind. A flerce fight for posses-sion of the wrench followed. The keeper called for help while the

sion of the wrench followed. The keeper called for help while the prisoners jeered at him and cheered Curtin on. Cuskey gradually was get-ting the upper hand when suddenly Curtin drew back and whipping out a long knife drove it twice into the keep-er's side and then pounded him on the head with the wrench. By this time lobs ford, another keeper had an head with the wrench. By this time John Fords another keeper had ap-peared in response to Cuskley's cries, and he closed with Curtin. Ford was the victor, but his arm was broken in the struggle. Cuskley's condition is critical.

# CHINESE IMPERIAL ARMY.

Changifu, Oct. 26.-A notable feature of the autumn maneuvers of the Chinese imperial army, which ended yesterday, has been a portable wireless telegraph apparatus, carried upon light wagons and so adjusted that it can be erected in less than 30 minutes. These stations were op erated by Chinese officers of the telegraph corps.

The maneuvers ended with victory for the northern army. At a village four miles south of Changtfu this army suc-ceeded in checking the advance of the southern army. The program began with cavalry operations followed Wednesday by artillery practise. All arms displayed excellent discipline. Experienced mil-tary observers are of the opinion that with the exception of certain minor de-fects and making allowance for the fact that the operations were an experiment, the maneuvers were almost equal to those conducted in Europe. The maneuvers cost \$500,000.
