The initial sale of the day was recorded by Daily Judge, which did business at \$1.12 1/2. GOING TO THE DOUGLAS.

J. D. Wood to Leave for Yerington, Nevada, in a Few Days.

J. D. Wood, president of the Nevada Douglas Copper company, expects to leave for the west in a few days for the purpose of beginning permanent development work on the property of that corporation, situated near Yerington, Nevada.

The intention is to begin work on a working tunnel, the portal of which will be located on the Casting Copper claim, in which Superintendent J. H. Smith recently exposed a lot of high grade copper ore. By starting the tunnel at the point indicated the strike will follow ore all the way into the heart of the mountain, and depth will be attained rapidly right from the start. It will not be very many months until the Douglas mountain will fairly teem with activity for it is the intention of the management to do things on a large scale.

LOOKING FOR COPPER.

California Being Searched for Properties of This Kind.

The search for copper properties in California, says a San Francisco correspondent of the Engineering & Mining Journal, continues, and new sections where the metal is found are being thoroughly prospected. In Siskiyou county, long known as a gravel mining section, location notices for over 5,000 acres of copper-bearing ground were filed during the month of July alone. The principal localities affected by these location filings are Glass mountain, Elliott creek, Little Humboldt, Salmon river and the vicinity of Sisson. Even up in Alpine county, where a large body of copper-bearing ore has recently been found, the copper properties of Plumas county are known to be of value, but will not be productive until the completion of the Western Pacific railroad. The mines are too far from transportation facilities at present. The most interesting point in the state just now, as far as copper is concerned, is the Greenwater copper camp in Inyo county, about 15 miles from the Nevada line. The mineralized zone of great extent, and some of the ledges show great width on the surface. The camp is at an altitude of 5,500 feet. Hundreds of men are flocking there to prospect. A number of men prominent in the copper mining industry have gone themselves or sent agents to secure bonds on some of the properties. Thus far, of course, there has been little development, but this is in progress. The water difficulty has been overcome as tank wagons are bringing in water from distant regions. This company has been carrying on a very vigorous campaign of development for nearly two years and is approaching an interesting period of its existence. Officials of the company are confident that the mine will become a producer in the near future.

CEGAR COMPANY GETS ON.

Herman Barnett Brings Good Reports From Southern Country.

Herman Barnett, secretary of the Cedar Mining company's property, near Mord, came up from the south yesterday and tells in a good strike having been made in a cross-cut from the 225-foot level. A fissure measuring about 10 inches wide has been opened showing high grade lead-silver values. Assays show the presence of 67 ounces in silver, 14 per cent lead and \$1 in gold to the ton.

The annual meeting of shareholders of the City Rocks Mining company was held in this city yesterday afternoon, which resulted in the election of W. S. Shortly afterward the shareholders of the Sheba Gold & Silver Mining company, controlled by practically the same crowd that has undertaken the exploitation of the City Rocks, met in annual session, and a board of directors was chosen, consisting of W. S. Cleaves of Hancock, Mich.; W. M. McLaughlin, William Bath, John S. Harris and Matthew M. Van Orden of Houghton, Mich.; J. M. Burdick, New Britain, Conn., and S. P. Armstrong of Salt Lake.

MINES OF PISCHE.

Contract Let for Tunnel on the Mendah Group.

F. M. Laffan of the Nevada-Utah, says the Record of Pische, has a contract for a tunnel on his group of claims adjoining the famous old Mendah mine, and supplies and men left town yesterday for the scene of action. This is considered one of the best mineral sections in the Highland district and the showing on this property for the amount of work performed compares favorably with any of the producers there. Operations on the hill above town by the Nevada-Utah are more satisfactory to those interested than at any time during the past 12 months. This is occasioned on account of greater progress being made in every branch of development and the scene of action under the management of Chas. Swanton and Superintendent Ed F. Freudenreich is interesting to see. Meadow Valley No. 5 shaft under the personal supervision of Frank McNeil is now down 720 feet and is rapidly nearing the ore bodies, while Raymond & Ely No. 1, supervised by Foreman Leek has beat the record in its downward course for the past 30 days. The timber shortage is now over and everything is working full blast.

TAYLOR & BRUNTON PURCHASE GROUND

Near Bingham Junction Upon Which Will Be Built a New Sampling Mill.

WILL INCREASE CAPACITY

Of That Company's Plants to 45,000 Tons Monthly—Equipment Purchased.

The Taylor & Brunton Sampling company yesterday closed a deal for the purchase of a tract of land lying immediately adjoining the site of its present sampling plant near the town of Bingham Junction, and immediate steps will be taken towards the erection of a new mill which will increase the sampling capacity of the plants owned by the Taylor & Brunton company in this state by about 50 per cent. The unprecedented prosperity prevailing throughout the mining camps of the west at the present time has made the building of the new plant a necessity, and with business for many weeks, as has its competitor in this field. From Frank M. Taylor, president of the company, it was learned today that the present capacity of the plants is about 30,000 tons monthly; hence the new one will raise this to at least 45,000 tons. An order has been placed for the equipment and Vice President Woodbridge, who is looking after the details, is prepared to call for bids on the construction of the building. The new plant will be a strictly modern affair and will be provided with the latest automatic devices for the crushing and sampling of ore.

VISITED DRUM DISTRICT.
