LOCAL BRIEFS.

Power Engine—The new packing company is arranging for the installation of a 50-horse power engine, dynamo and switch board for electrical purposes.

The Lewis Obscures—The funeral of J. N. Lewis was held yesterday afternoon, from the Masonic hall, under the auspices of the Mt. Moriah lodge, cemetery.

Choir Meeting—The Eleventh Ward choir, of which Horace S. Ensign is the choirmaster, will meet this evening, and all members are requested to be present.

Gas Company Office—The Eldridge block premises recently occupied by Siegel Clothing Company, have been leased to the Utah Gas Company for 10 years, and \$10,000 will be expended on the building in improvements.

Going to Berlin—Mrs. W. R. Riter and two daughters leave Salt Lake for Berlin on Sunday next traveling with Col. Clayton and party. Mrs. Riter goes to visit her daughter, Mrs. Tracy Y. Cannon, who is living at the German capital.

Deserter Brought In—Police Sergeant F. M. Toot of Ogden delivered at the Fort yesterday afternoon, an alleged deserter named Bert Wilson, who enlisted at Los Angeles, and failed to show up at San Francisco whither he was sent to service.

Private Smith Dead—Private Oscar Smith of the Twelfth Light battery, who thought to escape from the guard while in confinement, and was shot for his pains, died yesterday, and was buried in the military cemetery with military honors.

Not Gold But Glittered—A lot of brass filings from a bicycle repair shop on West Temple street, got into the gutter yesterday afternoon, and the enterprising youth of the neighborhood soon thought that they had found gold "in paying quantities." For a time there was excitement, but the nature of the find was shortly discovered, and presently all interest died out.

Pioneer State Peace Meeting—On Sunday evening, in the Pioneer state hall, a peace meeting will be held, under the auspices of the National Council of Women and the National Woman's Suffrage association. Gov. John C. Cutler will preside, and an interesting program will be rendered. The public generally is invited to attend the meeting, and a special invitation is extended to ministers of the various churches. The feature of the evening will be an address by Col. Willard Young on the subject of war.

Honor System Adopted—The High school pupils adopted the "honor system" at a meeting following school hours yesterday, and over 100 names have been signed to the agreement, which is given in this resolution: "In the interest of the school efficiency and the development of the highest mutual and moral strength of the student, various colleges and minor schools of the country have adopted certain plans for the raising of the standard of the school ethics and habits of individual study and thought. Inasmuch as these methods have been found to favor and have been universally successful, we hold it feasible and advisable for the members of the High school of the city of Salt Lake to adopt a code of honor to be known as the honor system. Whereas, we recognize the fact that individual study is necessary for the highest mental development; and whereas, receiving aid except from a teacher or other authorized sources is fraught with dishonesty; and whereas,

the standard of this institution is impaired by such practice, in so far as they are concerned, we hereby resolved, that we, the undersigned, members of the senior class of the Salt Lake High school, do hereby solemnly pledge ourselves neither to seek nor obtain aid other than legitimate help, nor from notes or other manuscripts. That we shall not infringe upon the liberties and rights of fellow students or teachers."

MEETING OF VETERANS.

Those of Spanish and Philippine Wars Organize a Camp.

The veterans of the Spanish and Philippine wars met last night and organized a camp of Spanish War Veterans, patterned after the order of the G. A. R. The following officers were chosen: Commander, Joseph Systrom; senior vice commander, L. B. Eddy; junior vice commander, C. E. Deering; adjutant, E. Williamson; quartermaster, William Thomas; officer of the day, Morris Leary; officer of the guard, Ray Burton; chaplain, William Furness; surgeon, William Nelson, Jr.; color bearer, William Edwards. The trustees selected are: Three-year term, Thomas Slater; two-year term, Thomas Holberg; one-year term, Hugh McMillan. Those officers were installed last evening. A. N. Jarvis was installing officer.

Fifty names are already enrolled, and regular meetings will be held Tuesday evenings, in the city council chamber. The camp will be known as Camp E. A. Wedgwood No. 1, United Spanish War Veterans, after Captain E. A. Wedgwood of the Utah batteries. Over 700 similar camps have been established throughout the United States.

Salt Lake will be made the state headquarters for all camps which may be formed in the future. Any town in the state with 10 resident veterans of the Spanish-American or Philippine wars can organize a camp. The insignia, is a small button with a Maltese cross. A committee comprising H. E. Slater, William Nelson, Jr., and C. Wagoner will draft a constitution and by-laws. The society will be aided in perfecting its organization by the local departments of the G. A. R.

MEETING OF VETERANS.

Those of Spanish and Philippine Wars Organize a Camp.

The veterans of the Spanish and Philippine wars met last night and organized a camp of Spanish War Veterans, patterned after the order of the G. A. R. The following officers were chosen: Commander, Joseph Systrom; senior vice commander, L. B. Eddy; junior vice commander, C. E. Deering; adjutant, E. Williamson; quartermaster, William Thomas; officer of the day, Morris Leary; officer of the guard, Ray Burton; chaplain, William Furness; surgeon, William Nelson, Jr.; color bearer, William Edwards. The trustees selected are: Three-year term, Thomas Slater; two-year term, Thomas Holberg; one-year term, Hugh McMillan. Those officers were installed last evening. A. N. Jarvis was installing officer.

Fifty names are already enrolled, and regular meetings will be held Tuesday evenings, in the city council chamber. The camp will be known as Camp E. A. Wedgwood No. 1, United Spanish War Veterans, after Captain E. A. Wedgwood of the Utah batteries. Over 700 similar camps have been established throughout the United States.

Salt Lake will be made the state headquarters for all camps which may be formed in the future. Any town in the state with 10 resident veterans of the Spanish-American or Philippine wars can organize a camp. The insignia, is a small button with a Maltese cross. A committee comprising H. E. Slater, William Nelson, Jr., and C. Wagoner will draft a constitution and by-laws. The society will be aided in perfecting its organization by the local departments of the G. A. R.
