They fired on the fugitive once, but that was but a "grace note" for him, and only incited him to a prestissimo acceleration of speed. Finally, Hayes ran into a house

on Eighth West street and hid under a bed, whence he was yanked out with anything but "andantino" gentleness, and the arpeggios executed by his cap-tors as they threw him into an express in the musical dictionary. Hayes is awaiting court martial, and with a year's confinement ahead will have ample opportunity to compose a long serles of funeral dirges.
