## VICIOUS ATTACK ON LADY EMPLOYER

Mrs. Joseph Pontine Slashed With a Knife by Discharged Dishwasher.

MRS. KINSEY ENTERS ANSWER

And Cross Complaint in Divorce Suit—Death of Gerald Fitzgerald and Peter Nielson.

Ogden, Jan. 30.—Harry Schubey was arrested yesterday afternoon on the charge of assaulting Mrs. Joseph Pontine with a large knife. According to the story told the police Schubey had been employed as dishwasher at the lady's restaurant on Twenty-fourth street. He was discharged and told to keep away from the place. This treatment enraged him and as he left the restaurant he threatened to return and deal out vengeance on the proprietress. About 3 o'clock he returned to the restaurant and immediately began to abuse Mrs. Pontine, and without any cause whatever he pulled out a large knife and made several slashes at her. The screams and several parties nearby rushed to her assistance, overpowered Schubey and took him into custody. He cut several small gashes in the lady's arm but none of the wounds are serious. It is believed he would have killed Mrs. Pontine had it not been for the gentlemen who overpowered him. A charge of assault with a deadly weapon will be preferred against him.

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### DISTRICT COURT NOTES.

Joseph Martin Gets 13 Months for Stealing—Death Follows Diphtheria. Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., Jan. 30.—The defendant in the case of Caleb Tanner, et al., against the Provo Bench Canal company, was granted until February 6 in which to plead. The case of Utah County against Springville was dismissed on motion of plaintiff. George F. Shelley was appointed one of the executors in the estate of George Jackson. The case of the Upper East Union Irrigation company against David H. Jones was continued for a resetting. In the case of N. C. Christensen, et al., against George Beck justice of the peace of Lehi, judgment was rendered in the sum of \$4.50 and costs, also an order was issued restraining Beck from any further action in the case. Joseph Martin, who entered the room of W. E. Butler of Thistle, and stole some money, was arraigned on the charge of grand larceny, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to 13 months in the state prison. 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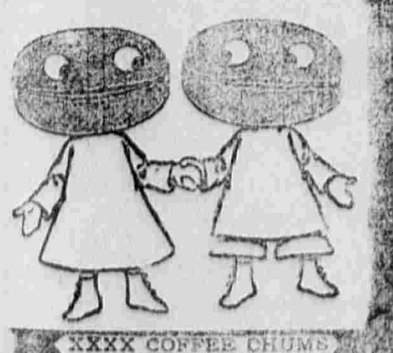
