Portland, Or., June 24.--In the arrest of Cho Win Doc, Immigration In-spector J. H. Barbour believes he has uncarthed an organized band that has smuggling Chinese into this been

According to Inspector Barbour, Cho has confessed that he and three of his countrymen reached Portland as stowaways in the chain locker of the German steamer Arabia, which arrived here Monday from Honkong. Accord-ing to the alleged confession. Cho says that during the trip he and his com-panions were provided with meals and generally cared for. Inspector Mar-bour states that Cho will be taken aboard the Arabia today and an effort made to have him identify the persons who cared for him during the voyage. The crew of the Araba are Chinese.
