

POLL OF SENATE ON COPORATION TAX

Before Taft's Program is Taken
Up He Will Know How Every
Member Intends to Vote.

ALDRICH HAS CHARGE OF IT.

House Leaders, Including Speaker
Cannon and Rep. Payne, Assure
President House Favors It.

Washington, June 23.—Before the senate takes up President Taft's program for the taxation of net earnings of corporations the leaders will know how every member intends to vote on the subject. The most careful poll that can be made will be in the hands of Senator Aldrich tomorrow and will be communicated to the president. It appears that the finance committee members were justified in assuring the president as they did last night, that the measure would be adopted. Representative John Dwight of New York, the Republican whip, promised the senate leaders today that if the senate takes up the corporation tax plan in the tariff bill, the amendment will be retained by the house. The fact that Representative Cannon and Representative Payne, assured the president that the corporation tax amendment would meet with favor in the house is said to preclude the possibility of defeat there. Aldrich, Wickham and Senator Root determined today that the measure should be made "amendment proof" before being offered to the senate. It is the intention of the senate leaders to resist any amendment that may be offered. The supporters of the Bailey-Cummins income tax amendment, which the president's plan is expected to supplant, have not abandoned their intention to obtain a direct vote on the question. If their amendment is displaced it is likely that practically all of the Republicans will vote for the corporation tax.

Portland, Or., June 24.—In the arrest of Cho, Inspector Barbour, who has confessed that he and three of his countrymen reached Portland as stowaways in the chain locker of the German steamer Arabia, which arrived here Monday from Hongkong. According to the alleged confession, Cho says that during the trip he and his companions were provided with meals and generally cared for. Inspector Barbour states that Cho will be taken aboard the Arabia today and an effort made to have him identify the persons who cared for him during the voyage. The crew of the Arabia are Chinese.

Chicago, June 23.—Rudolph Berndt, 14 years old, was fatally shot by a detective tonight while imitating Black Hand methods. He died later in a hospital, after being killed and forgiven, at his request, by S. E. Grossfeldt, a wealthy grocer, his intended victim. Mr. Grossfeldt was commanded in a letter signed "Black Hand" to bring \$15,000 to a certain street corner. He went there tonight, after detectives had hidden in the vicinity.
