## FIRE AT SYRACUSE.

Several Large Buildings Consumed by the Flames.

Utica, March 14.—A great fire is reported at Utica, N. Y. The Utica Journal has been unable to get full details, but it is known that much of the business portion of the city will burn. The Vanderbilt House, Montgomery Plaza, Hotel Utica, and several large buildings are in flames.

## RAVAGE OF THE FLAMES.

At 5 a.m. this morning, fire was discovered in a cigar manufactory in the Hogan block. In an instant it spread to the store of M. O. Hobart, hardware dealer, located just back of the same house. Within minutes every floor and the whole front of the building were a mass of flame. After a few moments the bell and siren were sounded and the fire department rushed to the scene. A number of houses were threatened, and the fire department turned to the rear of the Hogan block to save the rest of the building.
