LOCAL BRIEFS.

Annual Outing Saturday—The Brewster, Bottling and Drivers' association will hold their annual outing next Saturday afternoon and evening.

In Barratt Hall—Rev. Albert Buxton will lecture to the juvenile court officers and others on "The Juvenile Court Cause," tomorrow evening in Barratt hall.

Japanese Universities—C. L. Stephens, professor of English in the University of Tokyo, is at the Kenyon, en route east. He says that the leading universities of Japan are on a footing with the smaller colleges of this country.

Price to Issue Bonds—J. M. White, mayor and A. W. Horsley of the Price town board are in town to discuss in connection with the installation of a municipal electric light plant for the town. Bonds for the same will be issued.

McCharles Will Recover—Roderick McCharles, aged 58, of Eureka, Nev., was brought to St. Mark's hospital yesterday afternoon, suffering from a bullet wound in the head, the cause of which he declined to discuss beyond saying that he was shot without provocation. He will recover.

Did Not Survive Operation—Thomas Stephens of Henrieville, Utah, at St. Mark's hospital yesterday afternoon following an operation for intestinal difficulties. The body will be shipped to Henrieville, where the funeral is to take place Sunday afternoon. Deceased was a widower and leaves eight children.

Is General Superintendent—Official circulars announce that E. S. Murray, formerly general manager of the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company of this city, has been appointed general superintendent of the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company, with jurisdiction over construction and maintenance in California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona and Nevada.

Who Knows Thomas Bennett?—Mrs. Elizabeth Bennett Sutton, of 10 Knowles street, Radcliffe Lanes, Eng., is desirous of hearing from some of the relatives of her uncle, Thomas Bennett, who joined the Church about 60 years ago at Exton, Eng., and emigrated to Utah. No members of the family have been heard from since the English relatives for a period of 15 years.

Court House for Carbon—County Atty. L. N. Harmon, County Clerk H. C. Smith, and County Commissioner D. J. Thomas of Carbon county arrived from the south yesterday afternoon, and registered at the Wilson. They are here to raise \$15,000 with which to complete the new court house that is to cost \$25,000. The building is now being put at price, and will be one of the best court houses in the state.

Will Represent Utah—A dozen old soldiers, representing this state, will shortly leave for Toledo, O., to participate in the national convention of the Grand Army of the Republic. The convention is to be held there later in the month. The expectation is that Salt Lake will capture the national encampment for 1909. The arrangements for defraying the expenses of the veterans, in view of what is expected, was brought before the board of governors of the Commercial club yesterday at the afternoon meeting, and the board will see what can be done.

Eagles Flight to Seattle—Utah Eagles leave this city Sunday morning for Seattle in attendance at the national convention, about 100 strong, and representing the aerics at Salt Lake, Ogden, Mancus, Eureka and Bingham Junction. The arrangements for travel are being made by H. S. McCann, and the degree team of 16 men, under Capt. A. G. Mahan, will be in the party. The matter of capturing the \$500 prize offered by the Grand Aeris. The Utah people will be joined at Pocatello by Idaho Eagles.

Good Roads Conference—A conference was held yesterday between Mayor Brandford, the county commissioners, and representatives of the Automobile club, relative to the matter of improving Fifth East street, from Ninth to Twelfth South. Below Tenth South the east side of the street is controlled by the county, and the commissioners were assured by the mayor that the city's portion of the improvement would be undertaken at once, providing the county would improve its portion. The condition of roads and streets generally was discussed at the meeting.

Singers Release Tonight—John J. McClellan, conductor, Lon J. Haddock, manager, and John D. Giles, secretary and treasurer of the Salt Lake Choral society have issued invitations to local singers relative to taking part in the national eldstedoff which is to be given in this city in October. It is proposed to organize a choral here in Salt Lake of 125 voices to compete for the prize of \$10,000, and in case the choral wins, this amount is promised to the singers. The invitation states the first rehearsal will be held in the Salt Lake theater tonight, when members will be elected.

Boxelder Stake Excursion—The people of Boxelder stake held an enjoyable outing at Wandamere resort yesterday. In the neighborhood of 2,000 being in attendance on the peach growing county. Two special trains were required to haul the people in. A feature of the day was the baseball game between the Willard team and a team from Z. C. M. I. The game resulted in a victory for the Willard boys by a score of 11 to 9. Many of the visitors remained to attend the ball in the pavilion in the evening, taking the 11:45 train for their northern homes. Today the people of Alpine stake are having their outing at the resort.

PLURAL WIFE LOSES A REAL

Supreme Court Sustains the Decision in the Case of Leah Perks.

REQUESTS UNCONDITIONAL

Plaintiff Who Was Widow of William Poppleton Forfeited Rights to Property Under Will.

The supreme court, in an opinion rendered yesterday afternoon, upheld the decision of the lower court in the case of Leah Perks against the estate of William Poppleton, finding against the plaintiff, who was the appellant.

In 1883 William Poppleton, a resident of Cache county, died, and among the bequests was one to his plural wife, Leah Perks. The will contained a provision that Leah Perks would not be entitled to all the property should have only in the will, but should be divided and 20 acres of land.

When the will was probated in 1888, Leah Perks Poppleton claimed the full share named in the will, but the contest arose, the protestants asserting that she had become the plural wife of a man named Crabtree. This was not denied, but it was contended that the marriage mentioned by Poppleton did not include plural marriage, but referred only to the marriage sanctioned by the law of the land. The trial court held that the provisions of the will included any form of marriage believed in by the testator, and this view is concurred in by the supreme court.

OPINION OF COURT.

On this point the opinion reads as follows: "The testator had been living in Utah and had been practicing the usual customary domestic relations as they applied to those who accepted and practiced the monogamous system of marriage, then in using the term 'marriage' again it would be reasonable to suppose that he meant a monogamous marriage. The testator, however, was disposing of his own property, and he could impose any lawful condition upon any bequest that in his mind seemed proper. If he thus believed in his peculiar system of marriage and practiced that system with the very person upon whose bequest he imposed the condition, it would not follow that he necessarily referred to a monogamous marriage only. In the absence of any evidence to the contrary, the court will refer to the evidence in this case as being his offspring. He also refers to another woman in the same way and imposes the same condition upon the bequest made to her. It thus seems clear that it was the intention of the testator to make provision for his different families and thus provide homes for each of them. In this case, however, that either of the two women named should enter into the relation of wife to the testator, then the major portion of the bequest given to each should terminate and go to the children which were the issue of the marriage relation existing between the testator and the woman named in the particular bequest. In view of the time at which the will was made, and the state of the domestic relations then prevailing among many of the sect to which the testator and both women belonged, it is manifest that his view to 'marry again' did not exclude a polygamous marriage."

The decision was written by Justice Frick and concurred in by both the other justices.

LAND CANCELS.

State Board of Commissioners Adopts Resolutions on the Subject.

The state board of land commissioners, at a meeting held yesterday afternoon, adopted the following resolutions, respecting the cancellation of land selections:

Whereas, a number of citizens of the State of Utah have in good faith made application to the state board of land commissioners to select certain lands for the sole purpose of obtaining title thereto for grazing purposes; and Whereas, said lands are of great value to said applicants for such purposes and of no known value for any other purpose; and Whereas, the cancellation of the selections have been made in pursuance of said applications would result in great hardship and financial loss upon said applicants; now,

That the state board of land commissioners, duly and regularly in session at its board meeting on the 5th day of August, 1908, resolves that on behalf of the state of Utah, that it respectfully petition the honorable secretary of the interior and the honorable commissioner of the general land office to cancel any and all selections made heretofore made and held subject to cancellation, because same theoretically are supposed to contain coal, until such time as Congress shall convene, at which time this board urges upon the honorable secretary and honorable commissioner the advisability of recommending to Congress the passage of an act that will enable the United States to accept from the State of Utah a proper conveyance which will carry over to the United States all or any mineral or coal that may be within or throughout the depth of any such selection, or an act that will provide for the approval of such state selections with all the mineral or coal rights reserved in the United States.

PROMPT ARREST FOLLOWS DISPATCH

Chief Deputy U. S. Marshal Smyth Lands Man in Provo After Automobile Chase.

OHMSTEAD'S LITTLE SCHEME

Posed as Recruiting Officer for U. S. Navy and Induced Parties to Cash Worthless Checks.

When Gregory, the counterfeiter, was run down by the secret service in Salt Lake last spring, it seemed that a high water mark had been reached for clever hoodlums working in Utah, but a case ranking above work in Utah, both in the importance of the arrest method and the completeness with which the officials secured necessary evidence, was yesterday successfully completed. This time the entire credit, however, belongs to U. S. Dist. Atty. H. E. Booth, and to Chief Deputy U. S. Marshal Lucian H. Smyth.

At 10 o'clock yesterday morning a telegram was received from Washington ordering the arrest of Percy G. Ohmstead, for impersonating a U. S. naval recruiting officer. At 12:10 the man had been located as a guest at the Hotel Metropole, it had been found that he was there on a pleasure trip in an automobile, and the official party was ready to start in pursuit.

From 12:10 to 2:10 the automobile containing U. S. Dist. Atty. Booth, Deputy Smyth, and Special Deputy U. S. Atty. Maynard, was going at full speed through the streets of Provo. At 2:30 the automobile was encountered, with other passengers occupying it, and at 3 p. m. under arrest, and detained in place.
