A friend tells me of a young man who, having eaten a quantity of grapes, became ill, suffered intensely, was unable to get relief from any source, and finally died. A examination disclosed a large quantity of cherry pits imbedded in the bowels, together with about half a pint of grapes which had completed the work of death.—Fruit Culturist.
