

EASTERN NEWS.

The Eastern Mail arrived yesterday afternoon. The latest dates from Washington are to the 7th, from New York to the 8th, and from the frontiers to the 10th of March. As usual for the last four months, only a few of our numerous exchanges came to hand, and from those few nothing of particular interest could be gleaned.

There was some sparring in the House of Representatives on the 5th of March, in relation to the election of a chaplain. The following extracts from the proceedings will doubtless be interesting:

Mr. Millson was unwilling that the House should seem to be indifferent to a usage coeval with our government, and dignified by so many historical recollections. He, therefore, offered a resolution providing for the election of a chaplain to-morrow, to officiate alternately with the chaplain elected by the Senate.

Mr. Houston objected, contending that the resolution was not a question of privilege, there being no law for the election of a chaplain.

Mr. Millson replied, saying that there should be a daily invocation for Divine assistance and protection, and it should not be in the power of any one man by a solitary objection to defeat all conventional decencies and obstruct the rules of the House.

Mr. Houston regarded Mr. Millson's remarks as extraordinary, and repelled them.

Mr. Clemens showed that there is a law of Congress fixing the salary of the chaplain at \$750 per year. Hence there is authority to elect one.

Mr. John Cochrane had an essay to deliver on the subject.

The Speaker following the precedents, decided that the resolution was a question of privilege.

Several gentlemen raised points of order, and desired to extend an invitation to all ministers to officiate alternately.

Mr. Houston appealed from the Speaker's decision, which appeal was, on motion of Mr. Millson, tabled.

Much confusion prevailed throughout the whole discussion, half a dozen gentlemen at times speaking at once.

Mr. Barksdale moved to table the whole subject.

Negatived, 60 against 116.

Mr. Millson's resolution was adopted.

The proceedings of the House on the 6th were not received, consequently, we do not know whether the election for a chaplain was had or not.

On the 7th there was some loud talking in the House on the subject of slavery in the course of which Mr. Van Wyck said there was no attribute of God Almighty, no command in his word nor spirit of the gospel which tolerated the sentiments as uttered by Southern gentlemen, that slavery is a divine institution.

In the course of his remarks he said that Southerners talked about burning witches in New England, forgetting that slaves are burnt at the stake in the South.

Mr. Davis (Miss.) rose excitedly, and was understood to say that the assertion was false.

Mr. Gartell made the point of order that no member of the House had a right to libel the people of any section, and then deny an opportunity to its representatives to reply. He pronounced the assertion of Mr. Van Wyck false and unfounded.

Mr. Davis (Miss.) wanted to know whether Mr. Van Wyck was disposed to test Southern courage by going out of the District of Columbia?

Mr. Barksdale had asked permission to offer a resolution, the Senate concurring, to adjourn on the 4th of June.

Attorney General Black was very ill, and his recovery was considered extremely doubtful.

Gov. Letcher, of Va., on Saturday, March 4, sent to the Virginia Legislature a communication from Gen. Starke, the Mississippi Commissioner, urging speedy action by Virginia in favor of a Southern Confederacy for her self-preservation, for the preservation of the Constitution and the Union, and the equal rights of all the States and their people in the Conference.

Major Gaines, Paymaster of the Army, died at Fort Smith on the 18th of February.

A strike of the shoemakers of Lynn, Mass., which occurred about the 20th of February had extended to Natick, Marblehead and other towns and was likely to become general throughout the State. It had caused great excitement. The police force in the infected towns had been increased and the military ordered to lie on their arms and be ready for any emergency.

Washington dispatches under date of March 24, announce that the orders of the war department for the relief of New Mexico and the Texas frontier, have just been completed, and will be at once forwarded to the proper

officers. They direct the withdrawal of two regiments from Utah as soon as the movement can be effected. The first column will march by Bridger's pass, and take the eastern foot of the rocky mountains in the advance, toward New Mexico, near Fort Massachusetts. The other column will pursue the route over which Col. Ewing returned from Fort Bridger. These forces are to scour the plains in the regions of the hostile Indians, and where the mails have been obstructed in the Navajo country. They will then be posted in strong detachments in New Mexico. The troops now stationed there, when relieved by these forces, will march to the Texas frontier, and take a post in the regions where greatest disturbances from Indian hostilities exist.
