SAN FRANCISCO SEA WALL.

San Francisco, Jan. 18.-The supreme court this afternoon handed down a decision which is of great importance decision which is of great importance to San Francisco, as it means that funds will soon be available for the completion of the sea wall. The court sustained the validity of the so-called sea wall act, passed by the legislature in March, 1903, which authorized the state board of harbor commissioners to issue 3.2 200 000 lb hours to compulete the issue \$2,000,000 in bonds to complete the san Francisco sea wall.

The harbor commissioners proceeded

GIFTS FROM NEW ZEALAND.

Twelve Most Interesting Birds and Four Lizards.

Francisco, Jan. 18,-Twelve New Zealand's most interesting birds and four lizards, representing the only creatures of their age remaining in the world, have been presented by New Zealand to the United States and were sent on the Sierra during her latest trip from the Antipodes, en route to the government zoo at Washington, D.

New Zealand's gift includes four dwes, four Maori hens, four Kea par-ots and four tenatara lizards. The kiwi is a wingless and tailless bird, whose feathers are used in mak-ing mantles worn by the Maori chiefs. The Maseir hen, known in New Zealand as the weka, is a brown bird, much larger than the American hen.

The kea parrot is a bird weighing five pounds and is such a pest in its native country that a reward is offered by the government to induce its ex-

The tenatara lizard is about 30 inches long and is the only known survival of its age in the world.
