

FREE TRADER WAS SACRIFICED.

Thos. Gibson Bowles, Unionist, Says He Lost His Seat at Dictation of Chamberlain.

GIVES SOME PARTY SECRETS.

Estimates that His Opponent Received Assistance From a Fund That He Looked on as Corrupt.

London, Jan. 18.—Thomas Gibson Bowles, the Unionist free trader who was defeated at Kings Lynn, in Norfolk, by a tariff reformer, provides a new sensation in the campaign by the publication tonight of correspondence with Sir Alexander Fuller Acland-Hood, the chief Conservative whip. In this correspondence Mr. Bowles accused the Unionist party of sacrificing his seat on the dictum of Joseph Chamberlain, admitting that he is a Unionist free trader.

It is a scathing letter to Sir Alexander containing numerous allusions to the personal attacks, accusing him of a breach of faith and political dishonorableness.

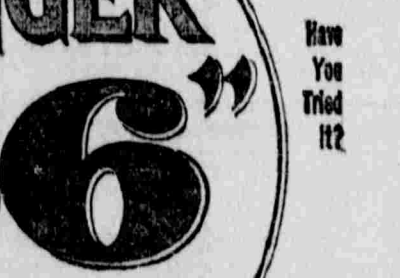

SAN FRANCISCO SEA WALL.

San Francisco, Jan. 18.—The supreme court this afternoon handed down a decision which is of great importance to San Francisco, as it means that funds will soon be available for the completion of the sea wall. The court sustained the validity of the so-called sea wall act, passed by the legislature in March, 1903, which authorized the state board of harbor commissioners to issue \$2,000,000 in bonds to complete the San Francisco sea wall.

GIFTS FROM NEW ZEALAND.

Twelve Most Interesting Birds and Four Lizards. San Francisco, Jan. 18.—Twelve of New Zealand's most interesting birds and four lizards, representing the only creatures of their age remaining in the world, have been presented by New Zealand to the United States and were sent on the Sierra during her latest trip from the Antipodes, en route to the government zoo at Washington, D. C.

NEW ZEALAND'S GIFT INCLUDES four kiwis, four Maori hens, four Kea parrots and four tanitara lizards. The kiwi is the world's only tailless bird, whose feathers are used in making mantles worn by the Maori chiefs.

MONUMENT TO DR. HARPER. Chicago University Sentiment Now Favors a Great Library. Harper has grown among the University of Chicago professors, students and alumni in the last few days, according to suggestions being received by the board of trustees. It is believed by a building almost a block long to cost at least \$1,500,000 will be constructed in honor of the great educator and builder of the university.

GEN. MITRE DEAD.

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 18.—Gen. Bartholome Mitre died today. He was 83 years of age. He was president of Argentina from 1867 to 1871 and general in chief of the army of Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay in the three wars with Paraguay. He gained considerable distinction also in literature, his work including a translation in Spanish of Dante's "Divine Comedy."
