Ogden, Dec. 11 .- All saloons and gambling houses in Ogden were closed up tight at midnight Saturday night and remained so until midnight last night. in accordance with instructions sent out by Chief of Police Browning to the officers and proprietors of these places. This reform move is not for a few weeks, but a permanent thing. It is a move that Ogden has long since needed. and those who are the instigators of the same are deserving of commendation. Ogden has been a wide open town, the aloons open from one month's end to saloons open from one month's end to another, Sunday and week days atike, with the exception that some of the saloonkeepers had respect enough for the public to draw their blinds, so that those passing by could not see what was going on inside, but the loud noises within and the ringing of glasses told the part of the salour on behind the

SCIENTIFIC MISCELANY.

The next 10 years in the view of a prophetic Erlitish engineer, will bring normous development of electric trac-ion, especially in supplanting steam on suburban branch railroads and short main lines. The incandescent lamp will be improved cheapening electric lighting, possibly to the extent of driv-ing out all other illuminants. Longdistance telephony will be greatly de-veloped, and wireless telegraphy will become established on ships, chiefly for safety. The generation and trans-mission of electric power promise liftle mission of electric power promise liktle advance unless some new source of electricity is discovered. Direct pro-duction of current from coal remains only a dream, and Tesla's transmission of power without wires is no better. The universal adoption of the steam turbine will be the only advance in power stations. power stations.

The gold in sea water has been es-timated by Prof. Liversidge as one grain per ton. In his British Associa-tion address, G. T. Beilby calculated that a pin-head drop of cyanide solu-tion of this richness—that is, a cubic millimeter of the weakest solution ob-tained in treating gold ore—contains a runner of molecules expressed by 125 number of molecules expressed by 125 followed by 18 ciphers, and that of these molecules 6,500 million are gold, which are less than 1-60000 inch apart. Another computer shows that even in this dilution the point of the finest needle would cover 1,500 gold molecules. Thus we touch gold everywhere in the sea, but we are not likely to separate it at a profit.

A blizzard which confined members of an Antarctic sledge expedition to their tent for five dars was a terrible experience, but a polar storm on Mars in 1890 lasted 41 days and another con-tinued two wasks. The second choice tinued two weeks. The recent observa-tions show that long storms with pro-langed clear intervals are characteristic of the weather on our neighbor planet.

While it is not proven that life has been generated artificially, the work of the last year or two has shown by so many experiments as to be concluso many experiments as to be conclu-sive that unfertilized eggs may be made to develop by inorganic chemi-icals. Ilke magnesium chloride. This indicates that life itself is a chemical process, not necessarily dependent up-on antecedent life, but rather upon proper combinations of elements and favorable conditions. It is now re-ported by a French biologist that if an egg be properly cut it will develop into as many as sixteen small but other-wise normal individuals. Whither these experiments are leading cannot even be guessed, but we may well heed the caution to be prepared for sur-prises. prises.
