MORAL WAVE HITS JUNCTION CITY.

Officials at Last Close Saloons And Gambling Dens Over Sunday.

TARDY REFORM MOVEMENT.

To Mark Last Days of Present Administration—Promises of Permanency Pleases Better Class of Citizens.

Ogden, Dec. 11.—All saloons and gambling houses in Ogden were closed up tight at midnight Saturday night and remained so until midnight last night, in accordance with instructions sent out by Chief of Police Browning to the officers and proprietors of these places. This reform move is not for a few weeks, but a permanent thing. It is a move that Ogden has long since needed, and those who are the instigators of the same are deserving of commendation. Ogden has been a wide open town, the saloons open from one month's end to another, Sunday and week days alike, with the exception that some of the saloonkeepers had respect enough for the public to draw their blinds, so that those passing by could not see what was going on inside, but the loud noises within and the tinkling of glasses told plainly what was going on behind the drawn curtains.

During the past two weeks frequent lengthy interviews have been held between District Attorney Halverson, Sheriff Bailey and Chief of Police Browning on the proposition, and in order that the chief would be backed up by the public prosecutor and others, the following letter was sent to him by District Attorney Halverson:

"From the newspaper reports, it appears that you are simply awaiting instructions from me before you enforce the state laws in regard to slot machines, gambling and Sunday closing, that I have so far failed to give any instructions. If such is the case, you are instructed to proceed at once to enforce the statutes in regard to these matters, as there has already been a great deal of complaint, that the laws are flagrantly violated. It is intended that unless the officers do their duty, complaint will be made against them for dereliction of duty."

Should any of the saloon men violate these orders, they will be punished to the fullest extent of the law; and should any of the officers fail to do their duty in seeing that the saloons and gambling houses are closed on Sunday, they will be prosecuted. There appeared to be no inclination on the part of any of the proprietors to violate the law yesterday, and it is firmly believed the officers will have no trouble in seeing that it is observed in the future. At the cafes where meals are served, with a bar attached, liquors could not be obtained yesterday on any consideration. A majority of the saloon men are anxious to comply with the law and welcome the enforcement of the law to the very letter, just as much as the general public does, but as there were some saloon men who would close their front doors and have their side or rear doors wide open on Sunday, those who are desirous of complying with the law felt that in justice to their business they must do likewise, but from now on all must obey the law or suffer the consequences.

The slot machines must go and gambling will be very stringently regulated and may be entirely abolished.

SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

The next 10 years in the view of a prophetic British engineer, will bring enormous development of electric traction, especially in supplanting steam on suburban branch railroads and short main lines. The incandescent lamp will be improved cheapening electric lighting, possibly to the extent of driving out all other illuminants. Long-distance telephony will be greatly developed, and wireless telephony will become established on ships, chiefly for safety. The generation and transmission of electric power promise little advance unless the source of electricity is discovered. Direct production of current from coal remains only a dream, and Tesla's transmission of power without wires, the greatest of the universal adoption of the steam turbine will be the only advance in power stations.

The gold in sea water has been estimated by Prof. Liversidge as one grain per ton. In his British Association address, G. T. Beilby calculated that a pin-head drop of cyanide solution of this richness—that is, a cubic millimeter of the weakest solution obtained in treating gold ore—contains a number of molecules expressed by 125 followed by 18 ciphers, and that of these molecules 6,500 million are gold, which are less than 1-60000 inch apart. Another computer shows that even in this dilution the point of the finest needle would cover 1,500 gold molecules. Thus we touch gold everywhere in the sea, but we are not likely to separate it at a profit.

A blizzard which confined members of an Antarctic sledge expedition to their tent for five days was a terrible experience, but a polar storm on Mars in 1890 lasted 41 days and another continued two weeks. The recent observations show that long storms with prolonged clear intervals are characteristic of the weather on our neighbor planet.

While it is not proven that life has been generated artificially, the work of the last year or two has shown by so many experiments as to be conclusive that unfertilized eggs may be made to develop by inorganic chemicals, like magnesium chloride. This indicates that life itself is a chemical process, not necessarily dependent upon an antecedent life, but rather upon proper combinations of elements and favorable conditions. It is now reported by a French biologist that if an egg be properly cut it will develop into as many as sixteen small but otherwise normal individuals. Whether these experiments are leading cannot even be guessed, but we may well heed the caution to be prepared for surprises.

The prosperity of Japan depends very largely upon the sea. A thousand varieties of fish—including the shark—are eaten by the inhabitants, the annual yield of the fisheries being 3,000,000 tons or three times the consumption in the United States. The value of this product is \$20,000,000. The coasts also supply an edible alga known as laver, and other sea-weeds from which good gelatine is extracted, together with large quantities of salt. From Japan, moreover, comes a large part of the world's coral and pearls.

The scheme became so popular at once that the demand could not be supplied and the number of soup barrows was increased by the hundred. It has already been demonstrated that the association will be kept active in the administration of its charity.

poisonous—is often contaminated with arsenic, selenium and antimony, and 14 cases of ill effects have been reported to the French Academy of Medicine. In one of the two forms of poisoning death results in two or three days.

In its regular habits, the Nile is found by Sir Colin Scott-Moncrieff, the British engineer, to be a model for other rivers and a source of satisfaction to engineers. It rises steadily from June to August, then falls—rapidly at first and afterward slowly—until the first June. The changes never vary a month in time. The country's well-being depends upon the river's absolute trustworthiness, as while the water's level changes 25 feet, an extra rise of 2½ feet would bring great danger to the whole region, and a failure of six feet in the rise would leave Upper Egypt as hard as flint and the November sowing would be impossible.

About 300 species of mosquitoes have been described, and it is estimated that 200 more exist. Gies recognizes only 36 species in the whole of North America, but Florida alone claims 22 species.
