

## BY TELEGRAPH.

## FOREIGN.

LONDON, 23.—A telegram from Ibrail, dated to-day, says, the Russians entered Matchin, to-day, the Turks having abandoned it. The Russians continue crossing here by a constructed bridge of steamers. Eight weeks of campaign have left the main body of the Russian forces still on the north bank of the Danube, but the decisive movement has begun. Already a sufficient Russian force had crossed at Ibrail to start a Turkish retreat from the Dobruja.

ST. JOHNS, 24.—Yesterday Mrs. David Topley observed two men running past the window of her house in Metcalf Street, and shortly afterwards it was discovered to be on fire. The alarm was at once struck. The Portland steamer had arrived by this time and was playing upon the burning buildings. Other houses were soon made thoroughly wet, and the sparks that were flying thick, rendered harmless. Hardly had this fire been quenched when the cry of fire was again heard. Hundreds of people who had been at the burning of the Topley House, rushed madly down the public stairs to the main street, there to find that Charles Day had been caught in the act of setting fire to a schooner laden with hay, lying at the steamer Star's wharf. The fellow was handed over to Major Cunard, who tied him securely with a rope, and succeeded in getting the villain in a carriage amidst cries of "Lynch him!" The Portland police station was reached, and the prisoner put inside. An attempt was here made to hang Day. One end of the rope with which he was bound was placed around his neck when Major Cunard effected his release by placing a revolver at the head of the man who held the rope. The enraged crowd, which followed to the station, finally dispersed. Thos. Slaven and Chas. Brown were arrested on suspicion of attempting to set buildings afire. There appears to have been a regular organized attempt to fire Portland, as the fires were started at the same time in many different places. The residence of Stephen E. Stephens was set fire to inside by some miscreant who obtained an entrance through an open door. There were forty-one prisoners in the city jail at ten o'clock last night, debtors included; eight were arrested during the day for various offences, one for stabbing, two others for attempted incendiarism. The city is under military surveillance. The food supplies for the destitute come in from all quarters. Active committees have been organized and are working well. The vaults of the Bank of New Brunswick were opened, to-day, and the contents found perfect. The city was patrolled by special constable volunteers, last night. No disturbances; all quiet, to-day.

LONDON, 24.—General Grant was present, last night, at a banquet given by the corporations of Trinity House. The Prince of Wales presided. Prince Leopold, Prince Christian, the Prince of Leiningen, Prince of Saxe Weimar, Duke of Wellington, Marquis of Hartford, Earl of Derby, Earl of Carnarvon, Sir Stafford Northcote, Mr. Cross and Chief Justice Alexander Cockburn were among the distinguished company present. The Prince of Wales, referring to General Grant in the course of his speech, said, "On the present occasion it is a matter of peculiar gratification to us as Englishmen to receive, as our guest, Gen. Grant. I can assure him for myself and for all loyal subjects of the Queen, that it has given us the greatest pleasure to see him as a guest in this country."

Speeches were made by several of the distinguished guests present. Gen. Grant responded in a neat speech.

OTTAWA, Ont., 25.—The following telegram was received, to-day, by the Governor General from Carnarvon: "I am commanded by the Queen to express the great sorrow with which she heard of the terrible calamity which has befallen the city of St. John. Her Majesty sympathizes with the sufferers."

ST. JOHN, N. B., 25.—The Daily Telegraph was issued on the morning after the fire, in single sheet, about a foot square, with two small advertisements and a description of the disaster which had overtaken the city.
