The factory had cost about \$1,000,000, and it spoke for itself. He was glad to see that our example had been imitated in Idaho. where they had also offered bounty to encourage the building of su-gar factories. He hoped the success of this industry would be followed by that of the slik industry, which needed aid and for which he spoke a special word of encouragement. He hoped that Pres-ideut Smith and those who had made a success of sugar, would noxt lend their aid to helping the silk industry get an equally firm footing.

PRESIDENT ANTHON H. LUND

made a brief address, in which he spoke of the relations of labor and capital. took labor to produce wealth, what wealth could do for labor was shown today. He urged the people to help the company by grow-ing beet crops, and believed they could rely on getting the full value for them. also urged the people to invest in the company, and by being stockhold-ers, secure a double benefit, first from the profits on their crops and then the dividends on their stock. He wished success to all concerned in this indus-
