burg Nationals will always be prominent in the controversy. "Tommie the weeb," as he is called, is one of the greatest ball players that ever donned a uniform and has surely earned a place in baseball's hall of fame.

For many years he has been an important member of the Pirates' brain department. As a third baseman he had few, if any, equals. His playing at station No. 3 was superb. Last season he informed Manager Clarke that he would like to play in the outfield provided that the management could obtain a youngster who could hold down third base successfully.

Since the opening of the 1909 campaign Leach has covered center field in admirable style. As a batter he ranks next to Wagner on the Pirates' roster and for many years has been up among the leading run getters in the National league.

Leach started his career with the Auburn club in the New York state league. This was back in the late nineties. From there he went to Louisville. In his first season with Louisville he was tried out from time to time at second, short and third, but never showed enough form to take the job away from the regular man.

During the following winter the Louisville and Pittsburgh clubs were merged, and in the settlement the management forgot to fire him. He was consequently carried along as utility man. This was the year that the baseball was broken out, and the season was not very old before Jimmy Williams, then third baseman of the Pirates, jumped to the American league, and Leach was put on third to fill in.

He had "found himself," and from that day until he insisted on being sent to the majors, he was a third baseman did not come into the big leagues.

When in future years baseball fans and critics are discussing players who have helped make diamond history the name of Tommie Leach of the Pittsburgh Nationals will be prominent.
