## UTAH JOCKEY CLUB TO HAVE NEW RULE

Will Adopt the Same as Is Now in Force at Jacksonville, Fla., and Will Go Hard With Kickers.

That the stewards of the Utah Jockey club propose to take action against the small army of chronic kickers and scandal mongers who tried to stir up trouble at the spring and fall meetings, is a certainty.

Manager W. W. Finn, who is now in Jacksonville, Fla., has written to President John Condon with reference to the matter and also sent a book of rules adopted by the club in Florida. One of the rules will be to expel the local club and put in force next year.

All petitions emanating from dissatisfied persons will meet with an absolute refusal from the management of the association. We are turning the very best accommodations to all that we can afford, and are trying to please all patrons. We realize that we cannot please the chronic kickers, nor do we intend to please them. We are always ready to listen to any reasonable complaints, but will not tolerate the petitioning of a room to be better than his own. We do not propose to stand for a lot of scandal mongers. Any persons making accusations or intimations against any official, owner, trainer or jockey, will be called upon to prove any and all accusations, and intimations, and all accusations and intimations of any kind will be ruled off the turf. If accusations are to be made, they must be made in the presence of the stewards.

Manager Finn is of the opinion that the above rule would fit the case of some of the owners who studied their horses at Buena Vista. Finn states that he will leave Florida early in the year and will have plenty of them for the next meeting.

## CHALLENGE WHIP TROPHY OF TURF

New York, Dec. 2.—A challenge whip, 72 in. long, the latest trophy of the turf, it will be emblematic of the superiority of the winner among the jockeys on the local tracks and will be offered for competition next year by the jockey club. It is understood that the whip will be worth \$30, its intrinsic value being increased by a diamond inserted in its head or top. Besides the stone it will be made up of whalebone and leather. Under the terms proposed governing the 4-d whip, the winner of the whip will have to win the whip two years in succession before it becomes his absolute property. The most successful jockey during a racing season here, the one with the greatest number of winning mounts, and the one who has advanced the winner of a claim on its possession.

On the last day of the local racing season the leading jockey will be presented with the whip. He may use it while riding his last mounts and may keep it in his possession, but not for use, during the following season. In order to insure the whip a bond covering its value will be demanded of the holder until such time as it becomes his property or is returned to the donors.

The turf authorities consider that the donation of such a prize will stimulate a healthy interest among the jockeys.

## FACULTY CONTROL OF ATHLETICS

Dr. Seaver Says Training Should be Given Only to Those Who Are Moral.
