The city attorney was requested to attend all meetings of the council.

The attorney was also instructed to take action against the millmen who allow sawdust to enter Logan river.

The councilman, Logan, gave notice that at the next meeting of the council he would move a reconsideration of the vote on the billboard ordinance.

The council transacted routine business and adjourned.

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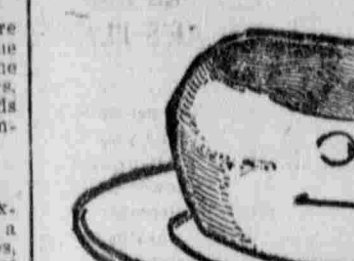
