APPROPRIATION BY CITY COUNCIL

Took Quick Action Last Night and
Will Give Ten Thou-
sand Dollars.

HELD A SPECIAL SESSION.

Call Was Issued by President A. J. Davis and Councilman Crabtree Made Motion for Relief.

A resolution of sympathy and an appropriation of \$10,000 for the relief of the sufferers from the earthquake and fire in San Francisco and other California cities was the result of the action of the city council at its special session last night. President A. J. Davis issued the call for the meeting late yesterday afternoon. When the council was called to order last night the call of the president was read. Councilman Crabtree at once secured the floor, and made a motion that the council appropriate \$5,000 for the relief of the afflicted people of California. The motion was seconded by Hobbay.

TUDENHAM'S AMENDMENT.
Tuddenham then moved as an amendment that the amount of the appropriation be increased to \$10,000. Ferry seconded the amendment. Crabtree accepted the amendment at once. Mulvey then suggested that a recess be taken to wait for other members of the council to be present, which was done. After the arrival of several other councilmen President Davis again called the council to order. Those present at the second call were Barnes, Carter, Crabtree, Ferry, Hobbay, Holley, Mulvey, O'Donnell, Tuddenham and Davis. The absentees were Black, Fernstrom, Martin, Preece and Wells.

THE RESOLUTION.
The following resolution was then offered by Ferry and Crabtree, and was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas, Our sister city of San Francisco has suffered a tremendous calamity; and

"Resolved, That the city council of Salt Lake City extends to the citizens of San Francisco and to the other sufferers of California the heartfelt sympathy of the citizens of Salt Lake City; and be it further

"Resolved, That an appropriation of \$10,000 is hereby made from the mayor's contingent fund to relieve the distress of San Francisco's suffering citizens."

After the adoption of the resolution Holley moved that the sum of \$10,000 be appropriated out of the mayor's contingent fund for the aid of the sufferers. The motion was seconded by Barnes and was carried by a unanimous vote.

COMMITTEE APPOINTED.
Mulvey then moved that the president appoint a committee of three members of the council to act with the mayor for the purpose of furnishing any additional aid that might be necessary. The motion was carried, and Mulvey, Crabtree and Tuddenham were appointed on the committee. The council then adjourned.

The court adjourned until Saturday morning, and the jury was excused until that time.
