

lished themselves, and there were signs of disaffection among the Queen's troops in Ireland.

The Dublin *Evening Mail* of the 16th, announcing the seizure of the *Irish People* newspaper office, says it is suspected that the attention of the authorities has been directed to the existence in the city of Dublin of a centre of Fenianism, or a circle of the American National Brotherhood of St. Patrick. In the progress of their examination the police came to the conclusion that the office of the *Irish People* the avowed Fenian organ, was the locality to which nearly every returned Irish American proceeded on his arrival in this country; the establishment was accordingly seized, though no strange person was found in the house, no less than ten principals and employees of the establishment were arrested and placed in confinement in Parliament Street and in Adams and Crane Lane.

The person who seemed to have the chief management of the *Irish People* was Jeremiah O'Donovan, who was arrested while endeavoring to make his escape. The seizure of the publication was under the special order of the Privy Council. During the night various arrests were made, amongst them, a gentleman named O'Leary, the reputed editor of the *Irish People*, and George Hoppen, who had, it was alleged, connection with the paper. The prisoners were subsequently brought before the court and remanded for examination.

In the county of Waterford the circulation of treasonable ballads is on the increase, while the fact of a systematic night drill can hardly be doubted. An investigation was had yesterday by Lord Carew and the magistrates of Waterford with respect to the military drill near Ennis and Carthia. The number of men engaged in each of these midnight escapades is no doubt small, but the occurrence of similar practices in so many localities and different counties would seem, certainly, to show some secret management and common purpose.

A Washington letter says, that in reference to the admission of Southern representatives in Congress, on the negro suffrage question, negotiations are on foot to the effect that, if the Southern States adopt laws conferring the right of suffrage on all males, without distinction of color, who can read, the Southern representatives to Congress shall be admitted.

Washington, 29.

Letters from the U. S. Consul at Brundise, Italy, dated Aug. 30, say the Asiatic cholera had made its appearance in the Adriatic and Italian Peninsula, and at the time of writing seemed to be spreading in all directions.

Southampton, 20.

The *Albion* says Benjamin, ex-Confederate Secretary of State, intends to join the English bar. The cattle plague was increasing in London.

Prussia. The government has issued a proclamation, announcing the assumption, by the King of Prussia, of the title of Duke of Laurenberg, and the annexation of Laurenberg to Prussia. The King promises to carry on the government of the Duchies in conformity with existing laws.

Russell's letter to his agents abroad censures the German powers and says force alone is the power which has been consulted and recognized in France, and conquest is the only basis upon which Austria and Prussia established the convention. England deeply deprecates the disinterestedness manifested for public right and the legitimate claim to be heard when a question affects their destiny.

Russia officially declares that it will maintain the non-intervention policy in the Schleswig-Holstein matter.

New York, 1.

The Dominicans were celebrating the second anniversary of their restoration to independence, by many rejoicings.

Providence, R. I., 1.

The Rev. Dr. Francis Wayland, more than 28 years President of Brown University, was prostrated by a paralytic stroke, on Tuesday last and died on Saturday, aged 69.

Baltimore, 1.

The steamship *Somerset*, the first of the new line between this city and Liverpool, sailed hence yesterday with a large number of passengers; the vessels in the harbor were gaily decorated with flags in honor of the event; and the wharves were crowded with

people, who cheered the "*Somerset*" as she passed. Salutes were also fired from the forts.

New York, 1.

The *Times*' Jacksonville, Florida, correspondence has the following: Progress towards reorganization, under the administration of Gov. Marvin, is satisfactory and favorable to the Union cause.

The *Herald* has a letter from Berlin, in which the writer states that there is no diminution in the desire in Germany to emigrate to America.

Washington, 30.

The *Times*' special says the President has cleared his desk of all pardon applications, having granted nearly 1,500 within the past three days.

The detectives of the Treasury Department have succeeded in effecting two important arrests of counterfeiters; they were put on the track by the revelations of a counterfeiter named Eckart, captured seven weeks since.

Kansas City, 30.

The first through train from St. Louis, over the Missouri Pacific railroad, reached here this morning. The road is now in complete running order its entire length, and regular through trains will commence running on Monday next.

New York, 27.

Charleston papers of the 23d contain the following in a clause of the Constitution as adopted by the convention by a State vote of 98 to 8; the slaves in South Carolina having been definitely emancipated by the action of the United States, neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except in punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted shall ever be re-established in this State. An ordinance to repeal the ordinance of secession was ratified at the session on the 22d. A proposition to make the basis of the representation of the State rest upon the whole population, irrespective of color, was rejected by a large majority, leaving the clause as reported by the committee, making the white population alone, the basis of representation.

Nashville, 27.

A gang of thirty or forty guerrillas, near Springfield, Robinson county, yesterday commenced indiscriminate robberies and murders upon the residents of that locality. Thomas J. Payne was killed, his home was robbed and his family outraged. At Adam's station, on the Kentucky road, they plundered everybody they caught.
