SCHOOL BOARD MATTERS.

Board of Education Holds Another Session on the County For Tax Money Unlawfully Retained.

The board of education held a session last night, all members present except Treasurer, Clerk Marston was instructed to make an official demand on the county for tax money unlawfully retained by it. The matter is more fully set forth in the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the clerk of this board be and he is hereby instructed to make a demand upon the county court for the amount due the Salt Lake City schools on account of tax case retroactive to and including August 1st, 1905. There is due for the year 1905, \$15,000.00 for 1904, \$20,000.00, and \$20,000.00.

These sums were the Seventeenth ward school was ordered closed and the teachers and pupils transferred to the Irving school. Miss Hildon (Miss) was appointed a salary of \$50 per month. The committee on school law reported progress on the 7th.

The report of the committee on teachers and school work recommending the purchase of supplies for the High School and the amount of \$200 was adopted. The committee on teachers and school work also reported that some of the rooms at the Hamilton were not ready to be used as demanded immediately and recommended that Miss Dorothy Howman be given fifty dollars for instruction from Feb. 1st to 15th, and Miss Lucy Carter be employed at \$25 per month. Adopted.

Treasurer Barnett submitted his report for January on the board's finances as follows:

The report was read and referred to the committee on finance.

Appropriations amounting to \$5,000.00 were made and the board adjourned for two weeks.

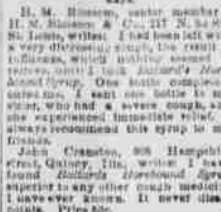
